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

It is undoubtedly true that the average gay persin has sex with a larger number of people than the average heterosexual, but it is not true that sex for the gay person is simply a matter of fum and not a means of expressing tenderness and warmth and love. Since procreation is not the goal for two men or two women in hed, sex for us is more a matter of communication. And through our experience with different people, we develope a wide range of skills and a broad perspective on sexual means of relating to people. While a diversity of sexual contacts often looked down upon by society and virginity is the expressed ideal, gays welcome the opportunity for intimate relationships with many people, and experience is more highly valued.

Traditionally gay people have had to separate sex from the rest of their lives. Heterosexuals could meet partners at work or at school, they could show their affection for each other as they skipped through the ; park, they could listen to their love celebrated in popular songs, they could have their relationships formalized by the church. None of these opportunities were available to gays. Our relationships on the job, in school, at church could never be whole because it was not safe express our sexual interests there. Therefore, at the end of the day or at the end of the week we went to where we knew gay people congregated: certain bars, baths and parks. We went or "feminine". It takes an unusually not out of choice, but out of necessity. Society permitted only these meeting places because they were the means by which we were kept in our place. By restricting our meeting , society forced us to act out roles in our search for each other that supported stereotypes of us. For example , they wanted to believe that we are more impersonal in our sexual relationships, that our sex less often occurs in the context of an ongoing,

stable relationship. First, they made it dangerous for us to be open about sex in our regular relationships. Then they provided meeting places, which, because we were so easily exposed, were also dangerous. Anonimity became necessary for survival. The person who led a double life could not allow his partner to know him well. life and reputation were at stake . Impersonal sex became an imposed way of life, and society confirmed its prejudice that this was basic to our nature. Our oppression reached into our bedrooms.

Little by little we are hearing a new statement: "What you do in your own bedroom is your own business. I don't care what you do as long as you don't parade it in public." That is also a new put-down because heterosexuals feel perfectly free to parade their sexuality in public. They make no effort to keep their sex behind closed doors. This double standard is their means for hiding their prejudice from themselves. Increasingly we are understanding this insult for what it is. And we are beginning to act as though we were actually equal. express our affection openly, just as others do. After years of being forced to do otherwise, we are reintegrating sex into the rest of our lives.

No one need be bound by traditional role playing, of course, but social pressures are strong and subtle. How ypu walk, what you do with your legs when you sit, how you cary your books, how you hold a cigarette, which emotions you express and when, and hundreds of other similar matters a determine whether you are "masculine" secure person to undo all this conditioning, even when he really wants to. It is easier for the gay person, who surrounds himself with other gay people, to shake this cultural baggage. His freinds do not make the traditional expectations of him. Lovers heterosexual do not question manhood and womanhood if one does not fit into the sterotupes.

Because sex is such a beautiful and ecstatic experience for gay people, we regret that it cannot be talked about as openly with others as it is among ourselves. And we are mystified about why the so-called authorities so consistently portray it etherwise. Perhaps someday the defensivness will lower enough that conversation can be based on truth rather than on lies.

EDUCATION

Since the beginning of the fall term the Waterloo Gay Lib has been involved in a few areas and education is one of them.

Our regular meetings have been very educational for some. Those with panels and speakers tended to draw the largest number of people.

Gay Lib has two video tapes, each about forty minutes in length, made when Dr. Franklin Kameny visited campus last year. Upon our last viewing, it was decided to reduce them to one tape by means of editing. This tape will then be available for use by classes on either of the two campuses.

with the aid of counselling services from the U of W, three sensitivity groups were formed this past fall. They consisted of a mixture of gays and straights. At the same time a few members from G.L.M. were meeting with many of the counsellors to discuss homosexuality. Our meetings with them were an attempt to broaden their awareness of gay people as well as to personally aquaint ourselves with the counsellors.

The Movement has also received many request for panels and speakers for classes or groups. So far we have met with two sociology classes, a kinesiology class and the Rap Roomers. At the moment we have requests from a couple of the high schools in the area as well as from Conestoga College.

This may be an area in which not many of the members feel personal feed back, but it is a very important part of the human liberation that we are working towards.
