Safe Sex Gets Hard to Swallow

WARNING: These guidelines contain explicit language. If you can't cope with reality, don't read on. (as it appeared in <u>The Muse</u>)

The gay men's safe sex guide that appeared in the February 15th issue of <u>The Muse</u>, Memorial University in Newfoundland, sent shockwaves through the country that are still being felt to this very day.

Readers of this article that was found in the Gay and Lesbian Supplement of The Muse were shocked to find explicit recounts of gay sex and strong language. The administration is in an uproar over the highly controversial nature of the article. The president of Memorial has been quoted as saying that the article is "pornographic" and is fearful that alumni donations could be hurt. (Later he retracted these statements....)

The local detachment of the RCMP went as far as stating that there will be a full investigation of the newspaper. The Muse is currently being held under suspicion with obscenity charges.

The staff and supporters of The Muse were furious. They realize the importance of direct and honest education about safe sex. It has been proven in many cities that direct (explicit) discussion about safe sex is the most effective and powerful way to educate the public. They feel that the general public is using them as an object to publicly gay bash and exploit. They argue that their work was not coercive about sex as compared to "... [the] avalanche of movies that are graphic, explicit and full of coercive sex...".

Supporters feel that the issue has been totally blown out of proportion and have discovered that reporters are more interested in the shock value and people's reaction rather than the AIDS education value.

In support of <u>The Muse</u> many other campus newspapers across the country have reprinted the article, or at least portions of it. <u>The Muse</u> has a significant amount of support from the collective of the Canadian Universities Presses (CUP). CUP has facilitated the distribution of the article to other papers with blazing speed.

The Cord at Wilfrid Laurier University reprinted a portion of the safe sex guide. The

reaction to their article was strong, swift and deliberate -- the staff was locked out of their own office. The student administration and "ethics committee" felt that this type of material was not suitable for WLU students' eyes. Judge for your self:

Anal intercourse with a condom (a lower risk activity)

As I woke up I could feel Mark's hard cock pressing into my ass and was immediately reminded of last night. My first move was to reach down beside the bed and grab the last remaining condom. Opening the package as I could feel mark smearing my ass with K-W. I could only think of the ecstasy I would feel within minutes. I put the rubber on the tip of his beautiful cock and squeezed the tip and rolled it down to the base. Squirting more K-W onto his cock he slipped into my already lubricated ass.

This explicit depiction of safe sex was enough to have <u>The Cord</u> closed for several days, and they risked being shut down. Now, <u>The Cord</u> Continued on Page 4



is allowed to exist under the close and careful watch of the student's union.

What does this all mean? As you can see, the het community is overly sensitive to the concept of gay sex. I think that we will see more of this style of writing in the future and until people get used to the idea of men having sex with men, and women having sex with women, it will continue to be a big issue. The biggest issue is that it is rather explicit about sexual acts that have been ladled by modern society as 'taboo'. This explicitness is necessary for educating men about having sex with other men. All too often men figure that safe sex = boring sex. The other problem is trying to educate the many men that have sex with men, but do not readily identify themselves as being gay, and therefore do not feel that they have to worry about contracting this 'gay disease'. This type of depiction is useful in demonstrating to all men that might have sex with other men, in a straightforward manner, how to do it safely.

Later on in the article is a quite comprehensive, and blunt, list of sexual practices that are high, lower, and low risk of contraction of HIV. This list includes information for het, bi, and gay readers. It is the hope that this blunt form of information will sink into the peoples' heads better than the typical message of "Use a condom" or simply "Play safe".

THE MUSE'S GUIDELINES FOR SAFE SEX: HIGH RISK OF HIV TRANSMISSION

Anal intercourse (ass fucking) without a

condom

Vaginal intercourse without a condom Sharing sex toys (dildos, etc.) without thorough cleaning or condoms

Any activities where there is contact from one bloodstream to another

LOWER RISK OF HIV TRANSMISSION

Anal or vaginal intercourse with a condom Unprotected oral sex on a woman during her period

Unprotected oral sex on a man (cocksucking) with or without swallowing cum

LOW RISK OF HIV TRANSMISSION

French kissing Drinking pee

Oral anal contact (rimming)

Eating shit

Giving or getting head (cocksucking) with a condom

Getting head without a condom

Giving head without a condom, no ejacula-

Oral sex on a woman without a dental dam outside her period

Oral sex with a dental dam

Congratulations to the staff of The Muse for having the guts to publish such a bold article and supporting gay rights in Canada. Remember that safe sex is everyone's business, so please follow safe sex guidelines and save your life.
