Homosexual activity among men is punishable by law — it earns up to seven years in jail — under section 121 of the Soviet Penal Code. Anonymous HIV Testing Clinics are supposed to run that way in Leningrad — but chances are, if you test positive, you will lose your job in just two weeks. These arejust a few of the injustices imposed on Soviet lesbians and gay men that the International Gay and Lesbian Human Rights Commission (IGLHRC) protested against during its July - August symposium in Leningrad and Moscow last summer.

It was an historic event. Never before had a foreign group of gays and lesbians assembled in the USSR. The delegation consisted of 65 Americans (including Harry Hay, founder of the 1950's Mattachine Society), one Swiss and two Canadians (Svend Robinson and myself). Although each delegate joined the IGLHRC with a common goal of improving the lives of Soviet lesbians and gay men, no one knew what to expect in the Soviet Union.

Throughout the trip, Soviet officials appeared complacent. Only one of the Moscow demonstrations was quashed by police - because it created a traffic jam. Both the Leningrad and Moscow conferences took place without interruption. There was, however, one short, daytime incident of gay

bashing just outside the Moscow Symposium location, but it didn't nternationa/ More than 200 Soviet participants attended conferences daily in both

> Even with the legal restrictions and constant harassment they face,

the Soviet gay and lesbian movement is strong and growing. A number of groups and publications (some even legally registered) have surfaced in Leningrad and Moscow. Fragmentation of these groups - a common reality in the North American movement - indicates that minority sectors, such as radical lesblans, are gaining ground, too. In fact, the Soviet gay and lesbian movement is currently parallel to the North American movement - as it stood in the early 1970's.

IGLHRC members continue to support the Soviet fight for gay and lesbian equality through mailings, phone calls and occasional visits. These are made possible through individual donations of time and money.

Soviet gays and lesbians are not the only ones facing injustices. The IGLHRC is sustaining its global fight for gay and lesbian amnesty on an annual basis. Plans have already been made for a 1992 delegation, although a location has yet to be chosen. Possibilities include South or Central America, or even South Africa.
