Wilfred Laurier Starts Own Group for Gays

In the past, WLU has had the oft-times well-deserved reputation for being a gay/lesbian hinterland. Anyone not conforming to the straight "norm" would have been considered unbalanced for attending a narrow minded, conservative and generally all-round prickish school. A person could expect to suffer from numerous incidents of verbal abuse as well as

threats of physical abuse (not to mention what professors could do to your marks). Laurier was, and in some ways still is, a really uncomfortable place for gay, lesbian and bisexual people.

But, as with all things, change can occur with time. Attitudes and the

situation at WLU are no exception. A number of policies have been either enacted (such as a sexual harassment policy with a wide mandate, including homophobic comments and actions) or at least considered. Policies that would never have been dreamt of in the past -- same-sex spousal benefits, for instance -- have only recently been considered (in this case, just late last term). These new policies could benefit those people negatively affected by the attitudes of other people at the school, as well as being proactive for some issues. These policies, however, were not created

overnight and had to have a beginning however small, someplace.

Such is the case for the formation of a student group concerned with issues of sexual orientation / preference at WLU. Staff and faculty are invited to participate, as are members of the community at large, although WLU Student Union requirements stipulate that a minimum

> of seven (7) WLU students are in support of the group. The idea of a student group is not new; there existed such a group beginning in 1983 but disbanded under various pressures in late 1985. Today, there is an initiative to re-instate this group with major support from key people including the WLU Student Union

President, the Vice President of University Affairs, and the Dean of Students. It is hoped that enough interest can be generated this school term in order to give the group full status before the terms of office end for the Student Union leaders.

Possible topics include: coming out to family and friends, being open in a school or work environment, relationships with our parents. achieving intimacy with another person of the same sex, sustaining intimate relationships, practising safer sex without losing the immediacy of the moment, stereotypes about lesbians and gay men, internalized homophobia, role-playing in relationships, racism in the gay community, living in a heterosexual environment, gay and lesbian fiction, reaching out and rejection, friendships with other gay men and lesbians, body image and happiness, gay history, and developing a sense of community. Travelogue: Where Are Your Rights Respected?

While generally, most gay bars are safe enough, the areas they are sometimes located in are not. Gay frequented parks and cruising areas are for the most part NOT safe. Bathhouses are safer than both parks and going home with a stranger from a bar in which no one knows where you are going. Your own common sense is your best defence, places we mention as fun, and or safe or worthwhile are personal recommendations only.

Besides your personal safety there are also legal aspects to be considered. The only provinces and territories to have passed legal rights against discrimination by sexual orientation are Ontario, Quebec, Manitoba, Nova Scotia and Yukon. Remember which provinces support your orientation when you plan your next vacation.

Things are worse in the United States: 25 states still have sodomy laws. Of these 25 states, six discriminate against gays specifically and have homosexual sodomy laws only (Arkansas, Kansas, Missouri, Montana, Nevada, and Texas).

The "free" states have no sodomy laws, and thus you can not be convicted of same-sex anal or oral intercourse (above the age of consent, of course!). These states are: Alaska, California, Colorado, Connecticut, Hawaii, Illinois, Indiana, lowa, Maine, Massachusetts. Nebraska, New Hampshire, New

Jersey, New Mexico, New York, North Dakota, Ohio, Oregon, Pennsylvania, South Dakota, Vermont, Washington, West Virginia, Wisconsin, and Wyoming. Only three states to date have a comprehensive gay rights law in place: Wisconsin, Massachusetts and New York. On a global scale, as of late 1989, homosexuality is not illegal in Thailand, China, Brazil, Argentina, Colombia, Mexico, Peru and New Zealand, as well as most **European and Central American** countries. This is not to state that it is fully legal in these countries, but in a lot of cases a complete denial of its existence.

On the other hand there is definite legislative laws against homosexuality in: Romania, Cuba, Chile, Ecuador, Jamaica, India, Singapore, Malaysia, Pakistan, Bangladesh as well as the Islamic countries of North Africa and the Middle East plus the rest of Africa and the Caribbean.

Back on a more local level, there are now 68 North American municipalities that have enacted some form of protective legislation. So enjoy your travels, be careful and be proud of your gay identity. Next month's **TRAVELOGUE** will feature Los Angeles. Remember, Guest columns are always welcome, too, if you've travelled somewhere and are willing to share your adventures and opinions on the bar scene and other gay establishments and events, not to mention the natives!
