The Coalition for Lesbian and Gay Rights in Ontario recently submitted a proposal to Health & Welfare Canada for a grant that, if accepted, could effect positive changes for our communities across the province. Project Affirmation: Proposal to Identify and Address the Health Care and Social Service Needs of Sexual Minorities in Ontario will span three years, be over- seen by CLGRO, directed by an Advisory Committee, and carried out by professional (paid) consultants, co-ordinators, and

group facilitators.

The purpose of this project is to develop a needs assessment process which will empower sexual minorities, in concert with human service providers, to explicitly define problems within the hea

explicitly define problems within the health care and social service systems, create responsive programming, and thus, create healthier social environments in all of Ontario. We hope to achieve this by means of: a needs assessment study to be conducted across the province; hosting of a province-wide conference that would address issues arising from the study; implementation of actions and activities for change in health care and social services.

In order for this project to have a direct and positive impact for all, efforts will be made to have equal representation of our communities from across the province. This project could provide members of our communities with an exciting opportunity to get involved in effecting change.

A letter of support to Health & Welfare from as many groups and individuals as possible throughout the province is

The availability of support services for gay/lesbian/ bisexual youth has been noticeably absent for the last few years since Lesbian & Gay Youth of Kitchener folded. There has been a clearly identified need for such a group; the GLLOW phoneline has logged many calls from underage high-school callers with nowhere to turn and no-one to turn to. Since we cannot counsel minors on certain sex topics, GLLOW is often unable to help our younger brothers and sisters who may be struggling with their sexual identities at what is often a turbulent time in their lives.

GLLOW is currently doing its best to provide some counselling in the high schools throughout Waterloo Region through our Speaker's Bureau and High School Outreach Programmes. Our resources are limited, however, and we can only proceed one school at a time.

To further our goals, GLLOW is currently working with Cambridge resident A B and a high school student interested in starting up a gay & lesbian youth group in the Cambridge area. A is looking to hear from young people in the Cambridge area who would be interested in starting/supporting a group to meet the sensitive needs of gay, lesbian and bisexual young adults.

As the group is still in its infancy, much needs to be done. Volunteers are needed

Little Sister's Victim of Bomb Attack

As January's PTCC was going to press, at approximately 10:20pm on Tuesday, January 7, 1992, an explosive device was thrown into the stairwell of Western Canada's best-known gay and lesbian bookstore, Little Sister's Book and Art Emporium. The store, located upstairs at 1221 Thurlow Street in Vancouver, BC, was open for business at the time of the attack; fortunately, there were no casualties and only minor structural damage occurred.

According to the press release, this is the third such incident of a similar nature since the store's opening in 1983. Gays, lesbians, and bisexuals everywhere are

urged to write letters of support to Little Sister's. "We have no doubt," continues the press release, "that homophobia was the motivation behind this violent act. Violence is no stranger to [us]. With the support of our community, Little Sister's will continue to fight this oppression by providing a safe place..."

CLGRO Turns Seventeen

On Saturday, January 18th, I attended a Coalition for Gay and Lesbian Rights in Ontario (CLGRO) reception at the Westbury Hotel in Toronto.

The reception was held to celebrate the fifth anniversary of Bill 7, which introduced sexual orientation into the Ontario Human Rights Code. The official anniversary of Bill 7 took place on December 8; however, the reception was timed to coincide with the seventeenth anniversary of the formation of CLGRO.

People came from all across
Ontario, some on their own, and others
as representatives from CLGRO
member groups and working groups.

Christine Donald of CLGRO made the opening remarks and told us some

anecdotes about the lobbying effort for Bill 7. The Honourable Elaine Ziemba, Minister of Citizenship and Culture, re-iterated the NDP government's committment to the gay and lesbian communities across Ontario and made her support known for CLGRO's current lobbying effort, changing the legal definition of "spouse".

Openly gay former attorney-general lan Scott, now the MPP of the St. George-St. David riding was also present. He reminded the audience of the importance of lobbying efforts of individuals as well as groups such as CLGRO. The St. George-St. David riding encompasses the main gay and lesbian districts of Toronto, so Scott knows whereof he speaks.

Travelogue: City of Angels

Think of California. For most of us, two cities come to mind: San Francisco and Los Angeles. While 'Frisco is probably one of the largest gay meccas in the USA, LA is also a major epicentre. I visited California with my family in late August, 1991, and toured through San Francisco, Sausalito, Yosemite National Park, San Diego and Los Angeles.

First of all, travelling with your family is not as bad as you might think. Sure, it's inconvenient -- especially if you're not out to them -- to visit all the sights and sounds of our comunity, but it's not impossible. In my case my family is of the "if-we-ignore-this-and-not-talkabout-it-maybe-it'll-go-away" mindset. So, with a little tasteful discretion (avoid bringing strange but attractive people back to your hotel room...) and a lot of planning (let's see...if I take the express bus, then I can see Santa Monica Blvd and still get back to Rodeo Drive in an hour-and-a-half), you too can enjoy some of what LA has to offer.

LA is a huge city. Picture a metropolis sprawling from Metro Toronto to Hamilton. Add five freeways snaking through this metropolis. Add a LOT of people with a LOT of cars and a LOT of smog. That, in a nutshell, is LA. Traffic is heavy, but manageable. Contrary to popular belief, it's not congestion that slows you down, it's the sheer volume of traffic on the roadways. If you're going more than ten or twelve blocks, count on anywhere from an hour to two hours to get to your destination, by freeway.

Three major gay districts of LA include West Hollywood, Hollywood, and Silverlake. These three districts lie along Santa Monica Blvd in north central LA. West Hollywood is predominantly a gay male's area. Populated by blonde, buffed Californian boys, West Hollywood is the favoured talent pool for the West Coast pornographers. Many a gay porn flick has found its models (please! these aren't "actors") in the bars, clubs and cafes of West Hollywood's Santa Monica Blvd and Melrose Ave.

Santa Monica Blvd is a wide street that truly is a boulevard, complete with a landscaped, tree-lined island that runs most of the length of the street. The boys walk hand in hand down the street, or cruise the boulevard in cherry-red convertibles, their arms around each other. West Hollywood is widely regarded to be the most nearly all-gay city in the USA. All types of bars, from the most elegant to the downright raunchy, proliferate on Santa Monica Blvd. During the daylight hours, the huge glass, marble and neon facades exude cool sophisticated elegance in tones of grey, mauve and aqua (and you thought nobody outside of Miami used aqua!). When the night falls, however, loud pumping dance music spills out from the open cafe-style windows into the brightly-lit street. Neon rules the night and the glare from flashing headlights is dazzling. Day or night, the boys are everywhere!

Long an institution in our community, the A Different Light bookstore is a place not to be missed. One of the very first of our bookstores, A Different Light sells all kinds of literature, from screenplays to pornzines; posters to paperbacks; buttons, flags, banners, newspapers, records, tapes, cd's, enviro-friendly products, reference materials, and all sorts of clothing. It's also a great place to get your bearings from any of the friendly staff, who can tell you where to go to get what you're looking for.

The famous Rage Club is also on Santa Monica Blvd. This cavernous dance club is immediately recognizable by the huge neon pink-and-purple triangle on the outside of the building. With up to five DJs a night on the multi-levelled dance floor, there is something for everyone at the Rage.

Cruising is a way of life here so don't be surprised if a casual eye sweep around the room causes more than a ripple of anticipation amongst the crowd! It's virtually taken for granted that if you walk in alone, you're available or are looking for someone who is. Despite this, there is a surprisingly friendly atmosphere at the Rage. People there are always ready and willing to lend a hand (or whatever) to a stranger in town. One might take pause and consider their intentions, however...as always, be careful.

For those of you into shopping (and who isn't?), both International Male and All American Boy have boutiques on Santa Monica Boulevard for all your fashion needs. Besides having an exhaustive range of fashion styles, the sales staff all look as if they've stepped out of the pages of their respective store's catalogues (especially that cute blond in the All American Boy store—thanks for the food, the shirt and the invitation, Chris!). Rodeo Drive is just a short distance away for you more well-heeled (if not high-heeled!) types with large amounts of money to spend...

While West Hollywood has plenty to offer for the men, the women (and the womyn) may find themselves at a loss for things to do. The bars are about 70% male and 30% female. The A Different Light bookstore is a good place for most women to start. Monthly art shows, lesbian writers series and likely Southern California's most complete collection of lesbian literature, magazines and cards are all available at A Different Light. The Palms and Caroline's Tea Dance, both in West Hollywood are also busy places for women.

Los Angeles is a great city. Like any large city, you have to take a few precautions; however, a little common sense will go a long way. Plan out what you want to do before you plunge headlong into unknown territory. Also keep in mind that if you look obviously like a tourist, you'll get taken for one. Play safely and enjoy your travels!

Call for Submissions

The second bi-annual Pan-Canadian Conference on Lesbian and Gav Rights will be held in Vancouver early this fall. The organizing committee, a broadly based group of lesbians and gay men from Vancouver, are soliciting submissions for the conference. The exact dates have yet to be finalized, but organizers expect the conference to run over the course of a weekend, starting at noon on a Friday. Registration fees will be set on a sliding scale, and it is expected that all events will be wheelchair accessible with daycare also provided. Six main themes have been proposed, and approximately 30 workshop spaces of 90 minutes will be made available. The following themes have been proposed: AIDS and the Law, Are We Family?, Lesbians and Gays in Law, Combatting Homophobia, Mobilizing Our Communities, and Strategies for Lesbian and Gay Rights. The categories are preliminary and will likely evolve as planning continues.

Porphyria Unbound

Recently, the Start Gallery exhibited works by Christine Dotzert and Debbie Johnson in a show entitled "Porphyria Unbound". Both of these artists, although working in very different styles and media, share a common interest. Their art deals with personal examinations of themselves as women living in modern day society. Although political in nature, their incorporation of the self and its own awareness of who and what it is relative to society is strongly evident.

Debbie has chosen to work in a large size with charcoal on paper. Her works are extremely expressive and often involve the subject of a self-portrait juxtaposed into the image of a goddess or a mother figure.

Most notably, her series of self portraits in personal questions. Exquisite attention detail and choice of visual subject me has yielded a body of works which streflect Dotzert's personal insight and questioning of societal issues important.

the first gallery expresses her struggle to adequately examine her own self-importance.

Christine's work tends to be much smaller and her approach much more controlled. Her work with collage of appropriated images with her own drawing contrasts uniquely with the larger more expressive works of Johnson. Christine's use of text with images results in relationships of meaning which raise political yet perhaps more often many personal questions. 
