Death of University Gay Groups?

University of Western Ontario is still without a gay and lesbian organization. Although London is lucky enough to have HALO (Homophile Association of London Ontario) there has been no representative body for the university community since last year. The Western Gay and Lesbian Association was de-ratified soon after their application to the administration for funding was turned down. The University maintains that because WGLA could not show there would be enough members participating they could not justify the funding. The problem, as Richard L. Hudler (HALO President) sees it, is that there is no strong leadership for the group this year after its previous leaders graduated. He was quoted as saying "the main problem right now seems to be with a lack of leadership, and we can only hope that leadership will strengthen with the incoming students [next year]."

This brings to question the process in which gay and lesbian university groups are granted status. Because of the confidentiality of such groups most students do not 'register' as they would for

the chess club or rowing team. Membership is always registered artificially low, as GLOW, University of Waterloo's gay and lesbian group reports this semester there are only 24 registered members and any extra funding they get from the Federation of Students is based on numbers only. There are well over one-hundred university students who have, so far this semester, attended GLOW sponsored events such as coffee houses, discussion groups, volleyball nights, lectures, and bowling nights. GLOW also is the only gay community group in the Kitchener- Waterloo, Cambridge area and as such has a phoneline, counselling services, housing registry, library, archives, and outreach/ education program. (on the same funding base as other clubs like The Scrabble Club). This same problem arises time and time again. Currently Wilfrid Laurier University has been trying to start a gay and lesbian group but the WLU Student Union requirements stipulate that a minimum of seven full-time students and

A Straight Perspective

Humans have been interacting with one another for centuries. For us to interact more effectively we must seek a greater understanding of our fellow person, from their motivations and aspirations to their emotions and feelings. All this gives us a perspective on improving the world we live in for the next generation.

Although homosexuality is natural to some people, one would hope that others would make an attempt to understand people who feel they are homosexual. I use the word "feel" because I believe homosexuals feel their sexuality instead of playing a role which satisfies a strange curiosity.

I am heterosexual, but have worked towards understanding others who are different than me. When I begin to understand others I do not categorize them into a box where they are only a distant and detached being. In a more practical level I relate by seeing what our similarities are. From there I try to understand the diversity of the person. As I see things, we all have

the same basic features. One feature is sexuality; some men are gay, some women are lesbians, some are heterosexual, some are a mix. The important thing is to see that we are not creatures to be placed in a box, judged and prejudiced. From my perspective we are on a personality spectrum. I don't feel that we can be bunched into one area; we are all scattered across the spectrum and the composite represents us all. There are many differences. However, if we can find that which unifies us, use that as a source of strength, and use our diversity to give us energy to grow, then we may hope to find peace and a human race that cares for one another.

As a final point I hope this struggle toward understanding is not isolated to a particular group but seen as an effort by all to help one another. We are not working towards gay rights but human rights. Let's not use what divides us, but instead what unifies us. Δ

Faggot, Gay, or Homosexual?

On February 6, Peter J. Dillon, U of W Geography student and GLOW member, addressed a sociology class at Wilfrid Laurier University on the topics of homophobia and being gay.

Speaking before a class of 55 students, Peter spoke calmly and on a very personal level. He began by asking students in the class what they thought of terms like "faggot", "gay", and "homosexual". He then went on to explain that there was a big distinction between someone who was gay and someone who was homosexual. A person is homosexual when s/he experiences a sexual attraction to another person of the same gender but does not have any interest in being part of a gay culture or leading a gay lifestyle.

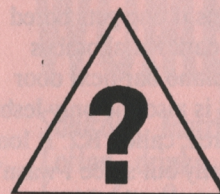
Being gay means to identify with other gay people, to have a sense of pride and respect in oneself and to accept and

become part of the gay community. Thereafter, Peter related to the class his experiences on coming out and with other concerns such as AIDS.

After the speech and questions, Peter said that he was glad it had gone so well. He said that he "had to educate those people because they were so ignorant [of the topic]. Their questions showed a lot of curiosity, but at the same time a lack of understanding."

In addition to his speech at Laurier, Peter has also talked at local area high schools. Dillon's speech at Laurier, however, comes at a crucial time because in the last couple of weeks there has been a concentrated effort to set up a gay and lesbian association there. Hopefully, by being open and honest about himself, Peter will have facilitated that process. Δ

Travelogue: Rencontres à Montréal

Rue Ste. Catherine Est is the only thing a gay male travelling to Montreal needs to remember. All the gay nightlife is on or within a block of this street. Its homofantasy time -- without leaving this 10 block area you can shop, cruise, barhop, fall in love, eat, cruise, catch a peep show, buy pornos, hit the tubs, peruse peelers, cruise, dance, digest a drag show, karioke, check into a gay hotel or guest house, and cruise all in an almost entirely gay atmosphere.

The hottest bar in the city (in the country even) is called **JOY**. It is huge -- don't plan to meet friends there because you will never find them, but even though it's huge there is still a line up by 11pm Fridays and Saturdays. The music is very alternative ("techno-house") and the crowd very trendy. The average age is between 18 and 30. For the over 25 conservative crowd **California's** is still the place to be,

especially in good weather with its patio. For the over 30's 'tougher' crowd, **Katakombes** in the huge **Station C** complex is hot -- follow the smell of leather.

Sundays at **JOY** are ok; they have started having shows to get a bigger crowd (remember even 400 people looks small in this place). The fun spot Sunday nights has to be the new **K.O.X.** (in Station C): a wide mix of people, music and drink specials plus pool tables, video

games, good size dance floor, perfect cruising layout, lots of bars & bar space and plenty of out-of-the-way private corners. It's pretty much an attitude-free zone (or maybe it was just my outfit) in contrast to **JOY**. Plus if one gets bored there is always the dark **Katakombes** downstairs, or the piano bar next door (**Kaché**). **Station C** is also the only lesbian bar of note in the area, called **K2**. It looked neat from the doorway but since I wasn't allowed in, no further details (I knew I shouldn't have worn that ensemble).

Other bars are **MAX**, a sociable evening crowd and a raunchy night crowd (this also holds for **Bar Rocky II & Taverne Rocky**) and **Campus**, with 45 dancers who take it all off (no, not all at the same time...). →

A visitor to Montreal must go to **Priape** out of tradition, for the provocative clothing, huge selection of pornos or just for the cruising. It shouldn't be missed. Just down the street is the **Wega** complex; good deals on pornos and a very cruisy cinema.

Other than in **K2** I didn't see any lesbians, I did see some good drag though... Our sisters must have their own area, I certainly didn't do them justice, hopefully some female who has done Montreal will tell us all where the action is happening, I'm sure **PTCC** will print it.

an executive support the group. Laurier is a small school and getting students to commit themselves, register their names and students numbers is a lot to ask. In essence it is asking them to come out and be open before they join a peer group aimed at helping them come out and deal with their sexuality.

If a school the size of Western can not maintain a gay support group how is Laurier going to? With the apathy, lack of funding and "outing" style registration Waterloo is experiencing will it be much further behind?

Let's hope that if that day comes the Kitchener- Waterloo- Cambridge area will have a community- based group to take over GLOW's work. Δ

The phonenumber is one of the central functions of the GLOW organization. Its purpose is

twofold - most importantly it provides counselling services and peer support to the community. As well, it provides information on community activities, bars and clubs, and local gay and gay positive organizations like WOODS and ACKWA. Counsellors are trained in everything from sexual orientation issues to safer sex guidelines, but especially in being friendly.

Sister of the Month

Eleanor Roosevelt

(1884-1962)

Eleanor served as the U.S. First Lady from 1933 to 1945. After the death of President Franklin Delano Roosevelt, she traveled around the world as a lecturer, columnist, and goodwill ambassador, seeking international peace.

Shortly before her death, she was voted "The Most Admired Woman in America." Recently uncovered letters written by Roosevelt to her close friend, journalist Lorena Hickok, indicate that the two shared a lesbian relationship that lasted the duration President Roosevelt's term in office. Δ

Brother of the Month

Leonard Bernstein

(1918-1990)

Bernstein, better known as "Lenny" to his friends, was the award-winning composer of "West Side Story", "Candide", and "Trouble in Tahiti". He was also a famed conductor, and produced definitive recordings of Beethoven and Mahler. A wealthy New York native, Bernstein helped out in many AIDS fundraisers before, tragically, succumbing to AIDS-related causes in 1990.

In 1988, Bernstein publicly addressed the long-standing rumours of his homosexuality, as well as his image as a "bleeding heart" liberal:

"Most people do think of me as just another pinko faggot, a bleeding heart, a do-gooder;" he commented, then added after a pause, "but that's what I am." Δ

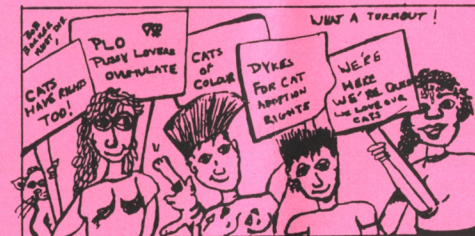

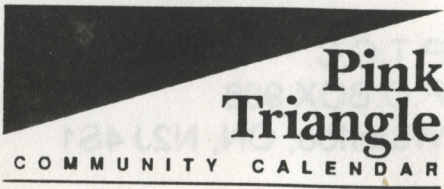
