KUDOS TO LESBIAN FILM FESTIVAL

I spent the weekend of April 2, 3 and 4 steeped in lesbian culture. Not that I don't consider every weekend in my life lesbian, without needing an event to sanctify it, but this weekend was marked by the First Annual (we all hope) London Lesbian Film Festival.

The festival was organized by a group of women led by Monica McQueen. There were several films and videos each night, ranging from seven to thirty minutes from the US, Britain and Canada. Their directors were diverse in subject matter, styles, and ages. The youngest was an American teen who began making films at fifteen on a Fisher-Price plastic camera -kids today: what a difference, eh?

There were presentations from the repertoires of the pioneer Barbara Hammer, Toronto's Margaret Moores, and many other independent film-makers. One American director acknowledged the unwitting support of a US national charity. Any way you can, I suppose....

Each evening was structured around a theme including: lesbian visibility, diversity, and the criteria for the label

"lesbian film". The latter was on the final night and was billed as women-only space. Kudos to the organizers for this last step. This isn't an easy time to be an out of the closet lesbian (when is?), but being a radical, bordering on separatist, lesbian requires a special courage.

Sponsorship was provided by Womansline Books, an excellent store in London. My companions and I went there to acknowledge their support and enjoyed the selection and atmosphere so much that we plan to return in the near future.

A special screening of the lesbian classic *Born in Flames* ran Friday afternoon on the campus of the University of Western Ontario.

You may be wondering about the quality of the films themselves. I hesitate to critique any of them individually because, as my friend put it, "Who cares? The fact they exist at all is a miracle!" I agree, but would also like to point out that there were some very well-made films here, sensitively and imaginatively shot, and often with good humour. Many myths and themes were toyed with...

Group Tackles Tough Questions

The GLOW Discussion Group is a great success according to a usually reliable source. The Discussion Group at the University of Waterloo began as an experiment in late January of this year. It was an attempt to provide an environment in which we might explore lesbian and gay issues by sharing personal experiences. From January to the end of April there have been a total of fourteen meetings, each focussing on a different topic. Some of the topics discussed were: •How do I fit in? •What do I want in my relationships with other people? •How do we develop an intimate relationship? •Is there a place for gays and lesbians in the Church? •AIDS and closeness with friends and lovers. •Dealing with breaking-up. •Experiences from our youth.

At present, there are various places in KW where you can be with other gay men and lesbians. If you are looking for a support group like ours, you now have another possibility. Our group has had a good mix of students and non-students, men and women, and a generous spread in ages of participants. The meetings provide a non-threatening opportunity for interesting discussions. We operate on a first name basis only. Participants share experiences if they are comfortable doing so; no one is obliged to speak.

Join us on Tuesday evenings in room 173, Environmental Studies Building 2, University of Waterloo. We begin our

discussions at 7:30pm sharp and go until about 9:30pm.

The RCMP outed 8,200 gays during the 60s, reports *the Globe and Mail*. This came after the KGB caught and blackmailed a gay clerk in our Soviet Embassy found in a compromising position. It was refreshing to see that the differentiation between straights and gays isn't as predominant in Montréal. Nova Scotia Art Students Unite

The Lesbian, Gay and Bisexual Collective of the Student Union of the Nova Scotia College of Art and Design (LGBC/SUNSCAD), the first ever such group at NSCAD, announced its inception earlier this year.

LGBC representative Michael Charland writes of the latent homo-hatred that is still around: "In a small community such as ours (600+ students) homophobia does exist; our posters have been removed, homophobic graffiti takes up space on bathroom walls". But despite the prejudice and fear, "We have finally come together!!"

The collective has much planned including meetings to discuss the particular needs of gay artists; a collective exhibition for Gay Pride Week;

organizing the second annual AIDS benefit fashion show and much more.

"We're now meeting weekly in a room on the campus. We're mainly concerned with what it means to be a gay artist. We have no courses here that deal with gay and lesbian issues; as a result the teachers and professors here are more sympathetic than knowledgeable."

"We work out of the Student Union office and we don't have a phoneline yet," explains Charland, "but the Student Union is 100% behind us. We currently have a file on reserve at the library where people can locate information on the gay and lesbian communities.

Province Picks Up After Student Federations

The Provincial Ministry of Colleges and Universities is putting together a new "educational equity" project that involves a video presentation entitled *It's Your Life* targeting kids ages ten to fourteen who have been underrepresented in Ontario's post-secondary institutions.

University Affairs Officer Karen Wheeler is the co-ordinator of an eight-member volunteer team based in Toronto working with about two dozen "expert advisors". Among these "expert advisors" are a gay man and a lesbian, both active in their respective communities in Toronto.

When I spoke to Ms. Wheeler, she expressed sympathy and support for gay, lesbian, and bisexual students, although she observes that "...the [targeted] age group of kids may not...be fully aware of their sexuality yet", which is something to keep in mind.

As representatives of gay, lesbian and bisexual peoples, Gay & Lesbian Liberation of Waterloo (GLLOW) is interested in making sure this project will deal with issues of sexuality. There is no doubt that the homophobia and homohatred that exists on the Waterloo campus alone underscores the underrepresentation of gays, lesbians and bisexuals in post-secondary institutions. Sadly, the provincial and federal students' federations -the very people who should be working for change on our behalf -have had a woefully inadequate track record in dealing with issues sensitive to our communities.

According to statistics compiled by Ontario Federation of Students (OFS) campaign director Chris Lawson, only one sexuality-related campaign has been mounted by the OFS in the past three years: the "BGLAD: Bisexual, Gay and Lesbian Awareness Days" campaign. Compare this with five campaigns aimed

at women, four on funding issues and three on racism.

The situation is not much better at the federal level; the Canadian Federation of Students (CFS) have also released only one sexuality-related campaign in the past three years: the "Symbol of Horror, Symbol of Pride" pink triangle campaign that was initiated this year. Commemorating gay, lesbian and bisexual victims of Hitler's Nazi death camps, Pink Triangle Day (celebrated every February 14).

only one sexuality-related campaign has been mounted by the Ontario Federation of Students in the past three years

Four CFS campaigns have been aimed at funding issues, two on

women's issues, and two on racism. While these issues are important and affect a larger percentage of the general population; gay, lesbian and bisexual students face a particularly virulent and violent type of discrimination that needs addressing.

Any campaign must address the entire population. That is why the BGLAD campaign, while useful in raising awareness of bisexual, gay and lesbian people, did nothing to directly address the issues of homophobia and violence. The OFS campaign was not aimed at the people that needed to hear the message the most. This is a risk the provincial project may run into as well; it is not enough to raise consciousness, we must also work on deconstructing old stereotypes and eliminating violence.

In the wake of apparent inaction on the part of both OFS and CFS, this initiative by the province is indeed timely, and sorely needed. Coming Out to Rob Eichberg

Brother of the Month

Dr. Eichberg is best known for co-founding National Coming Out Day in 1988 but has been active in the gay community since 1967. A licensed clinical psychologist he has counselled thousands of gay men and lesbians. He has also helped groups of people by the thousands by facilitating DAWN (an adolescent's group) from 1967 to 1972, and by creating The Advocate Experience in 1978 (now known as The Experience -a weekend workshop held regularly throughout the country). Dr. Eichberg, now living in Santa Fe, New Mexico, also co-founded a gay rights political action committee in Los Angeles in 1977. About his book of last year *Coming Out; An Act of Love*, he says... "it is a book about coming out, telling the truth, and being powerful in your life. It is a book about being gay and about knowing and loving someone gay. It is a book about you and me and our families. Most of all, it is a book about love." "I hope we can respect each individual's personal, private, and public process of coming out. I urge everyone to move as swiftly as possible through this process, because it is in establishing greater honesty and truth that individual and societal healing occurs. Coming out is a process of growth and learning; coming out proudly is a statement of one's strength and integrity. Whether homosexual or heterosexual, we are each far more than our sexual orientation or any other limited concept we may have formed about ourselves. Each of us is radiant energy and all we truly have to give and receive is love."

Natalie Goldberg Finds Truth

Sister of the Month

Natalie Goldberg searches for personal truth using pen and paper. Discovering that she wasn't being true to herself as a housewife in the Midwest, she divorced her husband, became a zen buddhist, moved to Sante Fe, and did what she always knew was her calling.

A decade of daily writing produced her testament to personal authenticity; her book, *Writing Down the Bones*. It is as much about writing as it is about Zen philosophy, sanity, and Ernest Hemingway. Through her writing, which she uses as a form of Zen meditation, she came to face the lesbian side of herself: "The moment I pulled the last pages of *Bones* out of the typewriter, I said, 'Nat, I think you're done with the book.' The next thing that shot through my head was, 'And I want to be with women now.'"

So her new book, *Wild Mind*, is about Zen philosophy, sanity, and exploring her Lesbian self: "When I decided that I wanted to be with women, it was about boundaries and crossing over boundaries. The only thing that matched the wildness I felt inside when I wrote was kissing a woman."

In the end, she is a great role-model not merely because she is lesbian, but also because she champions personal freedom through personal truth: "It is scary to tell you I have slept with women, but what kind of a person would I be to encourage you to write the truth and then not tell the truth myself? And what kind of friend would I be to my sisters? and my brothers? And most of all, what kind of real compassion would I show myself?" ▽
