**Digitized Files - JPEG Version**: The JPEG version is of **lower quality** than the PDF version, but will generally be **faster to download** than the PDF version. If your Internet download speed is lower, then this is a better option than the PDF version.

Digitized Files - PDF Version: The PDF version is of higher quality than the JPEG version, but generally takes longer to download than the JPEG version. After the file is displayed, we suggest that you set your viewing window as large as possible and then adjust the PDF magnification so that the text can be read comfortably.





# PRIDE PAST: The History of the Rainbow Pride Flag

PRIDE PAST is new column that outlines great moments in LGBT history locally, nationally and internationally. Future columns will include the past of our local Pride committees, Pride symbols and other issues relating to the LGBT Pride celebrations around the world.

This month we take a brief look at one of the most familiar LGBT symbols: The Rainbow Flag.

The number of LGBT symbols grows every year. One of the most colourful and widely recognizable of our symbols is the Rainbow Flag and its collection of colours - red, orange, yellow, green, blue, and

purple. These colours are intended to represent the diverse nature of our LGBT communities.

Gilbert Baker, a San Francisco artist designed the first Rainbow Pride Flag in 1978. The flag was created as a response to a local activist's call for the need of a community symbol.

Baker's original design was a flag with EIGHT stripes: hot pink, red, orange, yellow, green, blue, indigo, and violet. According to Baker, those colours stood for sexuality, life, healing, sun, nature, art, harmony, and spirit.

Baker approached a flag company in San


Francisco about mass producing and selling his "gay flag". Mass production of the eight-striped version was impossible as hot pink was not commercially available at the time.

Baker reduced the flag to seven stripes for one year until it was discovered that the International Cooperative Housing movement had been using a seven-striped flag since 1925.

In November 1978, Harvey Milk, the first openly gay supervisor in San Francisco was assassinated. Wishing to demonstrate strength and solidarity after this tragedy, the 1979 San Francisco Pride Parade Committee decided to use Baker's flag design, which had been further reduced to the six colours that we know today.

Although the Rainbow Pride Flag was initially used as a symbol of LGBT pride only in San Francisco, it has received increased visibility over the years. Today, it is a frequent sight in cities all over the world. Variations exist for almost all groups that make up the LGBT communities.

Be proud and fly your flag high!
