PRIDE PAST: The Pink and Black Triangles

The pink triangle is easily one of the more popular and widely recognized symbols for the gay community. The pink triangle is rooted in World War II times, and reminds us of the tragedies of that era. Although homosexuals were only one of the many groups targeted for extermination by the Nazi regime, it is unfortunately the group that history most often excludes. The pink triangle challenges that notion, and defies anyone to deny history.

The history of the pink triangle begins before WWII, during Adolf Hitler's rise to power. Hitler revised paragraph 175, a clause in German law prohibiting homosexual relations, in 1935 to include kissing, embracing, and gay fantasies as well as sexual acts. Convicted offenders -- an estimated 25,000 just from 1937 to 1939 -- were sent to prison and then later to concentration camps. Their sentence was to be sterilized, and this was most often accomplished by castration. In 1942 Hitler's punishment for homosexuality was extended to death. Each prisoner in the

concentration camps wore a colored inverted triangle to designate their reason for incarceration, and hence the designation also served to form a sort of social hierarchy among the prisoners. A green triangle marked its wearer as a regular criminal; a red triangle denoted a political prisoner. Two yellow triangles overlapping to form a Star of David designated a Jewish prisoner. The pink triangle was for homosexuals. A yellow Star of David under a superimposed pink triangle marked the lowest of all prisoners -- a gay Jew. Stories of the camps depict homosexual prisoners being given the worst tasks and labors. Pink triangle prisoners were also a proportionally large focus of attacks from the quards and even other inmates. Although the total number of the homosexual prisoners is not known, official Nazi estimates were 10,000. Many historians estimate the number of gav men killed during the Nazi regime range from 50,000 to twice that figure. When the war was finally over, countless many homosexuals remained prisoners in the camps,

because Paragraph 175 remained law in West Germany until its repeal in 1969.

In the 1970s, gay liberation groups resurrected the pink triangle as a popular symbol for the gay rights movement. Not only is the symbol easily recognized, but it also draws attention to oppression and persecution -- then and now. In the 1980s, ACT-UP (AIDS Coalition To Unleash Power) began using the pink triangle for their cause. They inverted the symbol, making it point up, to signify an active fight back rather than a passive resignation to fate. For many the pink triangle represents pride, solidarity, and a promise to never allow another Holocaust to happen again.

Like the pink triangle, the black triangle is also rooted in Nazi Germany. Although lesbians were not included in the Paragraph 175 prohibition of homosexuality, there is evidence to indicate that the black triangle was used to designate prisoners with antisocial behavior. Considering that the Nazi idea of womanhood focused on children, kitchen, and church, black triangle prisoners may have included lesbians, prostitutes, women who refused to bear children, and women with other "anti-social" traits. As the pink triangle is historically a male symbol, lesbians and feminists have similarly reclaimed the black triangle as a symbol of pride and solidarity.



Watch this space for more information on London HALO Pride in the upcoming months.



Give Me Some Of That Latin-Boy Love!

Whenever Hollywood tries to depict the 'gay experience', we're left, more often than not, with something silly and insulting. Tinsel town's cookiecutter movie machine churns out what are basically straight films that have been sloppily injected with a token 'shot of gay'. Thank God for the independents!

Director Ela Troyano's Latin Boys Go To Hell compellingly explores the conflict between sex and religion. The film is characterized by the juxtaposition of erotic and religious imagery, as young Justin struggles to reconcile his desire with what he sees as his Catholic duty. This is undoubtedly a tough hurdle to get over, considering that Justin has not

fully admitted to himself that he prefers the company of men. His torment stems not from the plain and simple fact of his sexuality, but from his reluctance to accept -- and his inability to celebrate -- his natural penchant for man-love. An inevitable clash occurs, as notions of true love collide with contemporary liberal sensibilities and a genuine, unashamed desire for promiscuity.

Justin is constantly besieged by temptation, as hot young men enticingly invade his quiet life. First is Braudlio, a shallow, arrogant, but exceptionally virile specimen of manhood with a fetish for tight boys. Next is Angel, Justin's enlightened (but unfortunately straight) cousin. And then there's Braudlio's boyfriend Carlos, a sensitive actor/model with an obsession for the sordid and highly sexualized Spanish soap opera Dos Vidas (Two Lives).

Certain moments in Latin Boys Go To Hell are intentionally played for melodramatic shock value, drawing a parallel between the 'real' events in the film and the over-the-top, insane passions of *Dos Vidas*. This infuses the movie with a series of forceful double meanings, as excerpts from Dos Vidas reflect the inner turmoil in the hearts of the central characters. It's a narrative device employed here with assuredness and grace, enabling the film to transcend its low-budget roots. I only wish Dos Vidas was a real show. If it were, I'd be tuning in every day!

Based on the novel by Andre Salas, 1997's Latin Boys Go To Hell is in Spanish with English sub-titles and is rated [R]. It's available on VHS, but alas, not on DVD

Where Is The Colour In Our Pride Committees?

Along with millions of other TV viewers I watched history in the making on Sunday, May 24 when both Halle Berry and Denzel Washington won Oscars for best actor and actress at the 74th Academy Awards Ceremony. What a moving and powerful moment! A moment though tinged with embarrassment and sadness. It took 74 YEARS for any woman of colour to win best actress. The last time a black man won a Best Actor Oscar was Sidney Poitier almost 40 years ago. Disgusting! After Denzel won he told the press that he didn't want people to focus on his skin colour, but on his work. The spin-doctors in the media started this particular focus on things long before Denzel's win, so he wasn't going to get his wish on that front. The

extremely cynical critics say that the Academy gave the Oscars to Halle and Denzel out of a sense of guilt and shame, and manufactured this historic moment knowing that Sidney was receiving a lifetime achievement award that same night. I'm not a member of the Academy, so I couldn't tell you what was going on in their hearts and minds when they filled in their ballots.

This particular debate leads me to examine the lack of colour that is so strangely pervasive in our own Queer Culture. At every InterPride conference I've been to the lack of racial minorities that are involved in our Pride Committees comes up every year. Why don't queers of colour want to be involved? A queer woman of colour once told me in

a nutshell the reason: Why the @*?!& would I want to be the token person of colour in your racist environment? Good question.

Still, as a Pride Chair, I want to know how to make our event your event. This is supposed to be about "celebrating the diversity of our community". We want you to enjoy the event whether you are male, female, trans, gay, bi, lesbian, straight, married, single, a parent, a minor, a senior, black, white, native, south-Asian, mixed race, polyamourous, monogamous, disabled, rich, poor, and suffice to say the list goes on and on.

I would never presume to know what it is to be a person of colour. I'm not a person of colour and for me to even attempt to draw conclusions would be insulting and ludicrous. Although I do know that unlike being queer, there is no closet for people of colour to hide in. Queer people can pretend to be straight, but it's a little tougher for a person of colour to pretend to be white.

Why is it that our queer culture is very much a white man's culture? Look at most queer print media and most if not all the ads are directed to a very male and very white audience. Why does the lack of visible minorities exist within our community? Because we still live in a racist society, and being queer does not mean that you are not a racist.



They see the ability to change and the ability to affect change as the greatest strengths of the LGBT communities. "Using a combination of these strengths allows many community members to be more visible and to have power over themselves and others."

Asked if there were one thing that they could change about the LGBT communities, they said that it would be



What does Pride mean to Dave and Dan, as LGBT business owners? "Pride is necessary for all members of our community, along with our supporters to show diversity, from others, as well as respect for the past and how it has allowed us to be who we all are today. Pride means that we can standup and stand out from others and do something differently and not be ashamed."

WWRP Has Been Out & About In The Community!


