Miss Drew gave the crowd a stellar performance in her step-down before crowning the winner. The new Miss Club Renaissance is Bang Bang La Desh!



Pride Past: The Stonewall Riots

Gay and Lesbian Pride events across the globe (including marches, parades, festivals, rallies, and other events) commemorate the Stonewall Riots. The Stonewall Riots were the first time that gays (specifically, gay men and women, drag queens, and street people) fought back physically against police harassment and entrapment.

On Friday, June 27, 1969, the New York City tactical police force raided a popular Greenwich Village gay bar, The Stonewall Inn. Raids were not unusual in 1969; in fact, routine raids of New York City's gay and lesbian bars were frequent, with same-sex couples being routinely arrested for dancing together, kissing or showing other signs of affection. Individuals were also arrested for wearing clothing of the opposite sex -- considered "unlawful" by the police. On that night, however, frustration, fear and anger about societal oppression boiled over and New York's Finest were held at bay

for the rest of the night. The several nights of protest that followed have come to be known as the Stonewall Riots. The riots were three nights of violent street protests and arrests involving over 300 gay people who finally grew tired of all the verbal slurs, unfounded arrests and beatings the police had subjected them to.

Prior to that summer, there was little public expression of the lives and experiences of gays and lesbians. The Stonewall Riots marked the beginning of the gay liberation movement that has transformed the oppression of gays and lesbians into calls for pride and action. In the past thirty years we have all been witnesses to an astonishing flowering of gay culture that has changed this country. All across North America grassroots organizations have sprung up with the demand for a place in society, pushing for changes in the way

gays are viewed by society, and for protection from discrimination in jobs and housing. In Canada, Pierre Trudeau, Minister of Justice at the time, changed Canada's criminal code and removed the oppressive legislation that made homosexuality illegal.

Today, formal lobbying groups PFLAG, and thousands of local groups across North America advocate for gay men, lesbians, bisexuals and transgender people. There are hundreds of community centres offering support with youth groups and a variety of other services. As with most civil movements, the lesbian, gay, bisexual communities have struggled, sometimes taking two steps forward and three steps back, but it is a movement that will persevere and eventually overcome the prejudice, bigotry and hate of those who oppose freedom, tolerance and love.

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Pride 2002: One Perspective

From Stonewall in the late 1960's to "Queer as Folk" in the present day and age, you COULD say that we have come a very long way. The road was bumpy, full of many obstacles and detours. We CAN say. however, that Canadian members of the GLBT community enjoy many rights and privileges that are protected by law.

Your Waterloo-Wellington Regional Pride Committee is still in its infancy. It is a product of the hard work of many human rights activists. They had a dream of a society that was open to acceptance of those who, for whatever reasons or causes, differed from the socially accepted heterosexual norm in their orientations and their lifestyles. As minds and hearts have become more open because of education and human rights activism, we should perhaps keep in mind that Pride is more than just a celebration of who we are. It is also a time to remember those who made our events possible, because not long ago, one could be thrown in jail just for being a known and practicing homosexual.

We are fortunate to live in our country. Canada is a world leader in the human rights arena. There are more than 6 billion people living on Planet Earth. The causes of homosexuality are not known. It has been suggested that they may be social or genetic, but in either case, it perhaps could be said that one's sexual orientation is a matter of random selection. It is beyond the control of the individual. With so many people living in the world our genetic program has become very diluted. It has spread far and wide through procreation since the beginning of humanity. It may be said that the Biblical mandate to "be fruitful and multiply" has already been complied with.

We should appreciate the wondrous diversity of creation and procreation with the understanding that we have

an obligation to respect not only our world but also all living things. We depend on the earth's resources, its wildlife, and one another as we make our way through life. For most people, that way is not always easy. A major problem is that we are taught to judge each other and ourselves even though we have been advised not to, for we might ourselves be judged in an unkindly light.

In many countries, it is common for people to be murdered, tortured, imprisoned, persecuted and exploited because of their sexual orientation. Prejudice, discrimination and harassment are accepted and encouraged even in our culture in spite of our laws and the diverse nature of our population. These concepts are the fundamental reasons for conflicts and they are the motivations for human rights movements.

The rights we have today should not be taken for granted because we could find them taken away from us by a change in legislation. Rights are given to those who fall under the jurisdiction of, and only if they also benefit, those in whose hands power currently resides.

Accepted statistics indicate that at least 10% of the world's population is homosexual and about 15% is bisexual. Thus at least 1.5 billion people are not heterosexual in nature. Canada's population is about 30 million and we have about 7.5 million members in our GLBT family.

UNITED WE STAND, DIVIDED WE

FALL. There is strength in numbers. Consider that cliché when you think about Pride celebrations. Our people are everywhere. They may or may not be "out" as the saying goes but they are here, there, and everywhere. Many of them no doubt have fears of being "found out". To support the work of your local Pride Committee, you are helping to pave the way for others to come out of

hiding if they choose to do so. Your support and attendance at the weekend of events contributes to this. When your Committee members are trying to raise money for your local events, your participation not only contributes something of financial value but also helps make a statement and settan example.

Prejudice shapes both minds and actions but people are not born with negative sentiments and attitudes in their hearts and minds. We are all mentally conditioned to cultural embodiments from the day we are born, as ideologies and concepts are If YOU do not think that you count for passed on from one generation to the next through social institutions such as the family, religion, school and work. This is perhaps a bad social habit because many of today's social problems are a product of the past. We are beginning to realize this but changes take time and words from the past when placed inside a developing mind often have a life of their own, controlling thoughts, words and actions.

It can be said that self-righteous bigots are products of unenlightened ignorance and those who fit into this category need to be understood and tolerated by those of us who have to deal with them. They have a habit of being very selective and exclusive as they pass moral judgments upon others who have just as much right to be here as they do. They forget that all people are created equal. Bigots see themselves as being better than those who are not able to fit into their version of social acceptability.

"Love one another as I have loved you." These words were given with Love, Tolerance, Compassion, Forgiveness, and Understanding to a world in darkness. They did not fall totally upon deaf ears, and combined with the concepts represented by the words Hope, Peace and Harmony, there has been some enlightenment in the past 2000 years, but not

enough positive change.

As you know, we are at the beginning of a new millennium. We do not live in a world governed by Love, Peace and Harmony. We DO have some semblance of Hope but that flickering light may go out. There are those who fail to realize that if they make life a Hell on Earth for others it will come back to haunt them through never-ending conflict until there is absolutely nothing left. It will be as though nothing ever was, for there will be no one here to remember.

much in this world, think again. You are UNIQUE and SPECIAL. You DO make a difference just by refusing to live a life of lies and hypocrisy. If you have experienced pain in your life because you did not feel free to be yourself, remember that you have never been alone. That pain is an historic tradition endured by pretty well everyone who has ever lived. For the elite who run this world it is perhaps not worth considering for they are few among many. They do however keep us busy fighting among ourselves because it suits their purposes - to keep them at the top of the material ladder.

PRIDE events are history-making events. Thirty years ago they could not take place. Even if you do not attend this year, keep that fact in mind as it is a part of your heritage and it shows what self-determination can accomplish.

HEATHER MCLEAN: Heather Mclean was born in 1975 in Leeds, England. Her parents returned to Scotland where Heather spent the next 10 years of her life, before settling in Cambridge, Ontario.

Heather played with the Barndwellers for 4 years and performed in Kitchener, Cambridge, Wiarton, Niagara Falls and Toronto's Indigo Café. They recorded one CD together before breaking up in 1998. After the break-up Heather recorded a CD of her own. On a tiny budget Heather recorded eight songs in a small home studio in Kitchener over a period of three weeks. She then moved to Blind River and worked as a Forestry Technician for The North Shore Tribal Council.

been leading a secret, dangerous but also alluring double life. Subsequently, we also discover that Big John has secrets of his own.






2) The after Pride party dance will run from 8pm to1am at Sheridan
