Some thoughts about Rainbow Chorus....

As a straight person, I joined the Rainbow Chorus after I heard them sing in their first performance at the AIDS Walk in May of 1995. I had enjoyed singing in various choirs all my life but subconsciously was yearning to sing songs and anthems from other than a religious origin.

Since then, being together to sing the poignant, triumphant, and 'campy' songs from the perspective of the gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgendered community has given me an opportunity to grow in my understanding of my sisters' and brothers' struggles for safety and freedom, their many sorrows and losses often leading to a rearranged sense of family, and finally, their outrageousness, rebellion, and mirth in the face of it all.

I have had so many experiences that I would not otherwise have sought - many ceremonies, memorials, services, and Pride Day events....

I attended a conference of Gay Choirs in Edmonton, which is one of the highlights of my life. The choral excellence of gay choirs across the country was truly astounding. We filled the city with freedom songs and laughter and there was dancing in the streets! I have even had the wonderful pleasure of singing with the Rainbow Chorus at my own wedding! I continue to be grateful for the inspiration and for the opportunity to be in solidarity with this community.



He has appeared as soloist with several orchestras including the International Symphony. Rob is the Director of Music for Calvin Presbyterian and The Children's Arts Program in Kitchener, as well as director of Camp Poco a Poco', a summer music camp for children. Commencing in September 1998, Rob assumed the duties of Music Director with both the Rainbow Chorus and the Coro Cultural Italiano di Guelph. He is continuing his musical studies at Wilfrid Laurier University.

ANN-MARIE MACDAIRMID has an honours B/Nus from Wilfrid Laurier University and a Minus from the University of Western Ontario. She is eurrently one of the staff at Music Plus in Kitchener. ... one last thought...

When asked the standard interview question, "What accomplishment are you most proud of and why?", I think for a moment (seemingly an eternity of weighing risks and benefits) and answer: "Being one of the four founders and an ongoing member of the Rainbow Chorus."

This is, for me, what the Rainbow chorus is about; providing an opportunity through our music to support the GBLJ and supportive communities and have an impact on the larger community. Over the years, the following experiences, lessons and circumstances are examples of why the Rainbow Chorus is so important to me and to our communities:

- or singing at vigils for the Montreal massagre and Matthew Shepard and seeing the effect these events had on each of the choir members no matter our gender or orientation
- or experience) with a safe and fun environment
- a performing wonderful music and seeing the impact that has on our larger communities
- watching the ripple effect of our existence as children, family, co-workers
 (potential employees if they ask the right question) and friends learn about our
 choir and communities
- α learning from the diverse membership of the choir about inclusion, and supporting all of our sexuality issues.

I have learned and continue to learn a great deal through my membership with the Rainbow Chorus, and look forward to many more years of learning and singing.

Murray Jose

In November 1994 four people collaborated to create a social activity that could represent our diverse community as well as provide a vehicle through which that diversity would be visible to our greater community. Murray Jose, Kevin Fallowfield – who has since passed away- Robert Bojeczko and Glen Pelshea agreed that a community choir might meet the requirements. Through a choir of Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Friends some of the perceived barriers about sexual diversity might be addressed in a safe and respectful manner through the universal language of music.

The foursome got to work and rehearsals began in January 1995 with perhaps a dozen participants at St. George's Anglican Church and Rob Gascho conducted the rehearsals. Murray Jose was given the role of founding chair. In February of 1995 rehearsals moved to the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints. In the spring of 1995 the choir performed its first debut at the AIDS WALK for the AIDS Committee of Guelph and Wellington county. The choir also began the process of developing a mission statement and made application for non-profit status. A first draught of by-laws and a mission statement was completed in 1995.

A key aspect of the Rainbow Chorus is to participate in community events, such as: a vigil for the Montreal Massacre, Toronto and Kitchener Gay Pride Days and union (wedding) ceremonies. This past year Rainbow Chorus lent its voices for an AIDS Vigil for World AIDS day in Hamilton, and performed in a Christmas concert at the River Run Centre in Guelph with five other choirs. The Guelph Chamber Choir conducted by Gerald Neufeld organized the concert; we look forward to singing in next year's Christmas concert with them.

In the fall of 1995 a new director was found for the choir. John Tute, an established teacher and performer, led the choir to new heights. John conducted the first Christmas concert performed by the Rainbow Chorus at Chalmers United Church in Guelph where the choir executed challenging pieces such as "FANTASIA" by Vaughn Williams.

We are very pleased to have Robert Phillips on board as our new conductor. Rob was hired in the fall of 1998. This is his third concert at the helm with Rainbow Chorus. Robert is well connected in the music community, and has brought with him an inclusive and respectful disposition. We look forward to learning with Robert and also to the ongoing challenge of educating the broader community on issues of lifestyle diversity.
