# **Preserving the Rainbow**

Looking back on the many things I have done to build bridges between the Queer and straight community, one of the absolute highlights was my being part of the documentary 'Rainbow Reflections,' created by local filmmaker Melissa Sky.

The Grand River Rainbow Community Historical Project was begun on March 14, 2011 by Jim Parrott, saying "by late 2011, it became clear that an obvious gap in the historical materials was oral-history narratives." In January, 2012, Jim and old friend Melissa Sky had an idea. In February 2012, it was announced,

"The Grand River Rainbow Historical

Society and Femme Fatale Creations are excited to announce that we are launching an initiative called Rainbow Reflections. This partnership aims to create a new documentary and set of video interviews of people sharing their memories of local rainbow history."

Jim Parrott recalls "reaching out to potential interviewees in Waterloo-Wellington; Ali Scott worked on developing interview questions.

Melissa began filming interviews in November and completed virtually all of them by December."

In the 2014 book, 'Out Proud: Stories of Pride, Courage, and Social Justice' by Douglas Gosse, Melissa wrote an article titled, 'Making History, Making Community: One Canadian Lesbian Story.'

"Becoming a mother and growing older myself inspired a curiosity about history that lead me to start working with the Grand River Rainbow Historical Society to create a feature-length documentary, called Rainbow Reflections, to capture local queer history. I began videotaping oral history interviews of everyday people in the region, asking them what it had been like to be LGBTO in Kitchener-Waterloo, Cambridge or Guelph in the 60s and beyond. I was floored by their stories. I lost my composure behind the camera more than once, trying to hold onto all these gorgeous, painful, funny and courageous stories."

Rainbow Reflections had its official premier on Thursday, January 9, 2014, at Little Bean Coffee Bar in Kitchener. Subsequent to this were other public viewings including at UW, WLU, University of Guelph, Rainbow Reels Festival and a

> Region of Waterloo initiative called 'Dialogue on Diversity.' At all these events there were opportunities for public discussion after the film.

I can attest to far more showings in smaller settings. This film has been a staple for years at Medix School, which trains people to work in public health fields. I also know of a group of disabled persons who used it to fuel their own discussions

about community and social justice.

I was recently asked how someone could order a copy only to discover the original stock is sold out and Melissa has yet to find a new supplier. There are fifty copies of this community treasure in circulation, with only ONE copy in the SPECTRUM lending library, along with a single copy in the Waterloo and Kitchener library systems.

I urge community members able to part with a personal copy to donate it to SPEC-TRUM, and hope a new batch is soon produced for the thousands still needing to see it, in this community and beyond.
