Fig Trees

Genre: Documentary, Operetta **Director**: John Greyson **Language**: English **Year**: 2009 **Length**: 105 min

Description:

In 1999, South African AIDS activist Zackie Achmat went on a treatment strike, refusing to take his pills until they were widely available to all South Africans. This symbolic act became a cause célèbre, helping build his group Treatment Action Campaign into a national movement -- yet with each passing month, Zackie grew sicker...

Fig Trees is a documentary opera about AIDS activists Tim McCaskell in Toronto and Zackie Achmat in Capetown, as narrated by an albino squirrel, an amputee busker and St. Teresa of Avila. Telling the story of Zackie's treatment strike in song, and the larger story of the fight for pills on two continents, and across two decades, Fig Trees performs musical and political inversion on the music and words of Gertrude Stein's 1934 avant-garde classic Four Saints in Three Acts. Using compositional techniques of chance, inversion, and polyphony, Fig Trees finds points of political harmony and musical convergence in operatic and documentary sequences.


Description:


How does it feel to have your gender identity included in the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders?

Diagnosing Difference is about the impact and implications of the Gender Identity Disorder (GID) diagnosis on the lives of 13 diverse scholars, activists, and artists who have identified on the trans spectrum. Using the diagnosis as a departure point, the participants debunk myths and misconceptions about transgender identities, challenge stereotypical gender expectations, and offer educative insight into the terms and language used to describe transgender lives.

Diagnosing Difference humanizes the debate around the GID diagnosis by valuing personal experience as a vital (and often ignored) form of expertise. Rather than trying to create an exhaustive examination of the diagnosis or offer claims of universal representation, Diagnosing Difference is purposefully personal, seeking to expand the experience of the audience, provoke thought, and create as many questions as it answers.

City of Borders

Description:

City of Borders follows the daily lives of five Israelis and Palestinians at Jerusalem's only gay bar as they navigate the minefield of politics, religion and discrimination to live and love openly. Set against the construction of the separation wall between Israel and the Palestinian territories and the struggle for a gay pride parade in Jerusalem, these inter-woven stories reveal the contradictions and complexity of the struggle for acceptance.

"Everyone comes from their own ghetto and meets at Shushan," says the bar's owner Sa'ar Netanel, a secular Israeli and Jerusalem's first openly gay city council member. Sa'ar's outspokenness has made him a target of numerous death threats.

In observing the patrons' daily fight for dignity and their very existence, this extremely relevant and inspiring documentary explores the bond forged when people from warring worlds embrace what they share in common rather than be divided by their differences.
