

Donna Kwasnicki: small pond is a body of work created over a four year period. Looking for a global symbol found locally and naturally, Donna began shooting waterlilies in Algonquin Park and a variety of small towns in Ontario. Using photoshop she individually manipulated each RAW image to simulate silkscreen and etching techniques.

Craig Musselman: This series is about FASCINATION. The past, the future, childhood hyperbole and adult fears-from mythological splendor to the shock of what technology will bring. Humans are curious creatures, their world in all its mundane ennui is sometimes made magnificent through the perception of the mind.
