



OPEN GAY ELECTED TO AUSTRALIA SENATE


Western Australian gay activist Brian Greig was elected to the Australian Senate Oct. 3. He will take his seat July 1.

JAPAN'S FIRST SEX-CHANGE OPERATION

Japanese doctors performed the nation's first legal sex-change operation Oct. 16 on a 30-year-old woman who is in the process of becoming male.

They removed her breasts, uterus and ovaries and will later fashion a penis by transplanting flesh from elsewhere on the body.

ARCHBISHOP OF CANTERBURY MEETS WITH GAYS

The head of the Anglican Church, Archbishop of Canterbury George Carey, met with members of England's Lesbian and Gay Christian Movement for the first time Oct. 16 at Lambeth Palace. According to LCCM: "In a very constructive and positive atmosphere it was stressed on both sides that transcending hostility was the central purpose of the meeting.

PALIMONY SUIT FILED AGAINST SKATER

TORONTO (AP) - Brian Orser, a pro figure skater and two time Olympic silver medalist, has lost a legal battle to prevent the public disclosure of a palimony suit filed by a former boyfriend.

Orser said Thursday he may have overreacted in trying to protect his privacy. Since Tuesday's ruling, he said "I have received a tremendous outpouring of support which has been a great comfort to In court papers, Orser, 36, feared his career would be ruined by the relevation that he was homosexual. But Ontario Court Judge Susan Langwrote that such a disclosure would not attract any public stigma in today's society.

Toronto banker Craig Leask, 35, sued Orser in January, seeking monthly support payments of \$5,000.00, property and access to Orser's vacation home. The lawsuit could be affected by a case before Canada's Supreme Court on whether Ontario's alimony laws should

Slain student's last moments by Kevin McCullen (News Staff Writer)

Suspect describes how he beat gay Wyoming man, watched as pal left him bound to fence

LARAMIE -- Matthew Shepard's tears cleared blood from a small part of his blood-caked face after he sustained 18 blows to the head from assailants who laughed at him as he begged for his life.

Aaron McKinney, 22, admitted to authorities that he struck Shepard three times with his fists and six times with the butt of a stolen .357-caliber revolver the night of Oct. 6, and watched as partner Russell Henderson, 21, tied the University of Wyoming student to a buck fence, according to court testimony Thursday.

Visiting judge Robert Denhardt bound



over McKinney, from Laramie, for trial on charges of first-degree murder, robbery and kidnapping following an all-day preliminary hearing in Albany County Court.

Denhardt heard testimony about McKinney's confession from Albany County sheriff's Detective Sgt. Rob DeBree, the lead investigator in a case that has attracted national attention, in part, because Shepard was gay.

Shepard, 21, was left tied to a fence for 18 hours before he was found. Albany County sheriff's deputy Reggie Fluty testified his head was covered with blood, except for a clean spot on his face "where he'd been crying and the tears went down his face."

He later died of his injuries at Poudre Valley Hospital. His autopsy disclosed he was struck 18 times in the head. He also was bruised throughout his groin area, indicating he'd been kicked, and the backs of his hands were bruised as he tried to cover his head. DeBree said.

McKinney confessed in an Oct. 9 interview with DeBree to joining Henderson in robbing \$20 from Shepard. Police later recovered Shepard's wallet in a dirty diaper in McKinney's home. DeBree also said McKinney told him that although he and Henderson knew Shepard was homosexual, the 5-foot-2, 105-pound Shepard did not "hit on him or make advances on him at the bar."

The pair lured Shepard out of the Fireside Lounge by pretending to be gay. But minutes later, as the three rode in a pickup truck, McKinney struck Shepard in the head with a pistol. DeBree testified that McKinney taunted Shepard seconds before he struck the first blow.

BRITISH SCHOOLS TO STAMP OUT ANTI-GAY BULLYING

British Education Secretary David Blunkett will send guidelines to the nation's teachers and school administrators telling them it is their duty to stamp out anti-gay bullying.

Surveys have found that victimization based on sexual orientation occurs in 80 percent of British schools.

One British daily said the new rules mean "that those who abuse classmates with terms such as 'poof,' 'queer' and 'lezzie,' or resort to physical attacks, can expect to be disciplined."

Margaret Morrissey of the National Confederation of Parent Teacher Associations is not impressed with the move, however.

"I defy the government to stop children calling each other names and we need to be very careful that a lot of time and money isn't wasted trying to do the impossible," Morrissey said. "When I was a girl we used to be told 'sticks and stones may break my bones, but words will never hurt me' and told to get on with it. That's what we did. I think we're becoming softies nowadays." police said.

TENNESSEE EDITORIAL FROM MEMPHIS

"For gays, it's an American Dream" by David Kushman

'Agenda' seeks only the basic rights heterosexual Americans take for granted.

The murder last month of Matthew Shepard, a young gay man in Wyoming who was viciously beaten, tied up and left to die on a fence, has stimulated grief, outrage and condemnation across the country, as it surely should have.

But rather than build support for the struggle for homosexual rights as an aspect of human rights, Shepard's lynching appears to have laid bare the growing polarization

that separates gay activists from their most bitter and outspoken opponents.

The issue of homosexuality continues to create deep ambivalence in this nation. Many Americans tell pollsters that they consider homosexual relations acceptable for other consenting adults to engage in, but at the same time find them morally wrong.

It isn't fair to say, as some militant commentators have suggested, that everyone who opposes homosexuality is complicit in Shepard's death, any more than everyone who opposes abortion rights must share responsibility for the recent murder of Barnett Slepian, a New York doctor who performed abortions.

Surely, though, the most extreme and bigoted expressions of these attitudes do contribute to a climate of hate that may encourage such atrocities. Would you trust the spiritual guidance of the so-called minister whose followers showed up at Shepard's funeral brandishing signs that read "God Hates Fags" and "AIDS Cures Fags"?

I've read enough of the scientific literature to be

persuaded that homosexuality is an orientation present at birth, not a sinful "lifestyle" or a "behavior" or an illness to be "cured." As gay activists routinely ask, why would anyone voluntarily choose a way of life that exposes him or her to so much abuse, harassment and bias?

Amid such divisiveness, what sorts of public policies might enable common ground to emerge? I'm skeptical that expanding state or federal laws defining "hate crimes" to include assaults on gays, and increasing penalties for such attacks, is the answer. If hate can be readily outlawed, why does so much of it remain?

Such proposals attempt to prosecute and punish thoughts, speech and motives rather than action - always a difficult proposition. They strike me as one more political attempt to substitute essentially symbolic responses to crime or more symbolic ones. ("Three strikes, you're out" legislation is another example.)

And the idea of same-sex marriage needs a lot more examination, of its legal and economic as well as its cultural implications. before many Americans will be prepared to embrace it.

That time, I suspect, remains a long way off. Congress and 30 state legislatures have passed laws that restrict marriage to a man and a woman. Voters in Hawaii and Alaska last week, by 2-to-1 margins, amended their constitutions to prevent court rulings from legalizing same-sex marriage. By contrast, court cases are pending in Vermont and New York that could authorize same-sex marriages in those states.

In the meantime, the best hope for decreased friction between gays and their detractors may lie in the continued movement of homosexual Americans toward greater visibility and participation in the political and cultural main stream. I wonder how many gay people the most contemptuous antihomosexual folks truly know - or, perhaps more accurately, realize that they know.

The gay people I know, in Memphis and elsewhere, aren't child molesters or degenerates or promiscuous Sodomites or marauding destroyers of civilization or, in Senate Majority Leader Trent

Lott's memorable characterization, comparable to kleptomaniacs. They're lawyers and journalists and politicians and artists.

They go to work and own homes and pay taxes and vote (Republican as well as Democratic) and serve their country and community and worry about their retirement savings and fall in love - monogamously. That is to say, they're Americans.

There may be gays who actually reflect the lurid stereotypes their opponents portray. I haven't met them. The gavs I know have no sinister. lockstep "homosexual agenda" and seek no radical "special privileges," only the basic rights heterosexual citizens take for granted not to be ostracized or discriminated against or threatened - or murdered - because of who they are.

Is that really so hard to understand?



Speech from the Matthew Shepard Memorial

[Editor's Note]
This speech was given at the Matthew Shepard Memorial March and Rally that was held on October 15, 1998 in Hartford, CT

When I heard the news... what did I feel? The white blinding, brain shivering, blood rushing, vengeance seeking RAGE tore through my body nearly shredding my heart. What is the correct response to such a heinous crime? Where do we express our outrage? Who can we count on to extract our revenge? How could this happen in our America? Why is that beautiful.-brave, caring, bright and loving gay boy dead?

The easiest to answer of those questions are "how" and "why": Because we are represented by politicians who feel free to call our lives a disease, an illness, a maladjustment and even a crime - and they do so with impunity. Because these politicians are not ripped from their elected positions with righteous indignation. but instead their coffers fill with donations and they are reelected to high

office time and again.
That is why Matthew
Shepard was beaten
bloody.

Because we turn for moral leadership to priests and pastors and ministers and rabbis who daily refer to our lives as "abomination". Because these men and women of God are not punished for that assault on our dignity and humanity, but are treated with respect and deference and their defamations are excused in the name of religious freedom. That 's why Matthew Shepard was robbed and crucified on a fence.

Because talk-show hosts get laughs making jokes at our expense. Because comedians build careers aping and demeaning us. Because Heterosexual actors win awards portraying us as "almost real people". Because newspapers and magazines lose no readership addressing their audience as if every one of us is straight. That is why Matthew Shepard was set on fire and left to die.

Because WE, in vast numbers, refuse to come out of the closet, thereby sending a clear message that even WE believe there is something to hide; that our lives are shameful; that being Gay or Lesbian is wrong. That is why Matthew Shepard is dead.

So, how should we answer this unspeakable act of hatred?

WE must begin by keeping a close watch, a constant visible and vocal presence at the trial of his slayers. We must not have a repeat of the Dan White fiasco. Let there be no "Twinkie Defense" for these cowards. Harvey Milkis assassination taught us a lesson we can NOT and will not forget!

WE must stand up in those cathedrals, synagogues, mosques and churches of hate- Stand up and state that we will not accept the preaching of exclusion. Stand up and walk out leaving them as bankrupt of members as they are of truth. Anything less, any compromise is permission to continue the persecution. Hatred has no compromise. If you need a place to put your faith and charity then seek an institution preaching love and acceptance for YOU.

WE must get out and vote! Let's stop electing representatives from our pocketbooks and wallets. Let's stop making excuses for politicians who are good

on some issues but will not stand up for us. Trust me, my friends, any hack can pass laws protecting your bank account. Let's hold them to a higher standard than that. If they want our votes and our donations make them take the heat for openly supporting our right of full lawful citizenship. They are our representatives. Make them live up to that promise or vote them the hell out!

When you are watching television and a comedian defames us - pick up the phone and call the station. They listen. They count every actual caller as the opinion of 10,000 viewers. You have power. Use it. When a movie or TV show portrays our lives, but there isn't an openly gay or lesbian person to be found anywhere near it - stay home!!! Boycott. Hollywood actually believes they are doing us a favor portraying us as "just like straight folk". Send them the message that heterosexuality is NOT the gold standard of humanity. We are proud to be just as we are and need no whitewashing, thank you.

Most importantly we must come out. There is no other way. WE must come out at our jobs. To our families. To our politicians. To our neighbors. If you allow no one to assume you are heterosexual they will never again freely make that assumption about anyone. That is how we change the world.

Finally always remember that we live in a capitalist system. Every penny you spend is a vote for or against us. When you buy a car from a company that gives money to our enemies vou have just voted against passage of the "Hate Crimes Bill". By the same token, when you use an airline that extends domestic partnership you have just brought us one step closer to the realization of equal rights for all.

We must conduct our lives as open and proud members of a huge and powerful community. We must take hold of our own destinies.

My sisters and brothers -We cannot bring Matthew Shepard back to life but maybe we can make his death the moment history records as the turning point of our struggle for freedom. It is within our power.

SAME SEX MARRIAGES by Jane McKenzie

This is the first of a three part series on same sex marriages.

In this article I will be discussing the law. In the second article I will be discussing the advantages of equality and in the third article I will be discussing the disadvantages.

The leading Canadian Case is a Supreme Court of Canada decision called

Eagan v. Canada [1995] SCR 513 which decided that the standard definition of "spouse" which excludes same sex couples is a violation

of one's right to equality before the Law as set out under section 15 of the Constitution Act. 1982. The Court had the option to "rewrite" all of the legislation with a discriminatory definition of "spouse". However, the Court specifically left it to Government to deal with the issue though legislation, failing which the issue would be addressed by the courts case by case.

This case effects the law across Canada. As a result of Eagan, Courts have ruled that same sex couples are entitled to spousal benefits, spousal pensions and spousal support and that same sex couples should be permitted

to adopt children. You may wish to check http://www.egale.ca/legal/courts.htm for an in-depth discussion of this developing area of case law. As a result of Eagan, it is widely anticipated that Parliament and the provincial legislatures will soon change the definition of spouse as virtually any legislation that does not treat same sex couples equally is unconstitutional. It is estimated that hundreds of statutes nation wide will have to be changed otherwise they will all eventually be challenged in the courts. Litigation is an extremely expensive way to enforce what, at present, seems to be an obvious right.

> The NDP government did attempt to change the law when it was in office and it is quite possible that this was one of the key factors

that lead to its defeat in the last election. Its own members were widely divided on the issue as was the province in general. I remember an unsettling incident that happened to me personally. direction. He then checkmated me and left the table leaving me wondering if my new hair cut had somehow provoked this outburst. My chess opponent is probably representative of the average view on equal rights for gay and lesbian couples. Indeed, there were several referendums on the issue of same sex rights during the recent American elections. The vast majority of voters voted against equality, thus creating a situation where laws allowing same sex marriages will most likely be re-written.

It would appear that the Courts and the public do not share the same view on same sex equality. The government, which is comprised of politicians whose ultimate goal is to be re-elected, has another option. Section 33 of the Constitution Act, 1982 allows federal and provincial governments to opt out of section 15 simply by adding a notwithstanding clause to any legislation that is in obvious violation of section 15.

It is clear that the debate will heat up as we get closer to the next provincial election. I understand that the Liberals are planning to include same sex issues in their election platform and the Conservatives have already made their position clear. Only time will tell which way the pendulum will swing. The scary thought of the day is that Hitler was elected by a landslide.

Sex and Sensibility: Why are some men losing the latex?

John Travolta, Boogie Nights, disco balls, bell-bottoms - everywhere you look, the signs are painfully clear that the '70s are back. And among gay men, a small but growing number are not just embracing the pop cultural kitsch of the polyester era, they are also adopting its pre-AIDS, anything-goes mentality when it comes to sex.

Every day, via e-mail and Web site message boards, "cum parties" - private gatherings designed for hooking up with men looking for sex without condoms are announced in cities all over the globe. The fact that such parties exist in an age where the AIDS epidemic is still a deadly reality is hard to believe. With the major selling points of these parties being unprotected sex and poppers, they seem a relic of the disco era. But regular attendees say that in the latex-covered world of the '90s, these gatherings offer a freedom they haven't experienced since AIDS first stepped onto the dance floor in the early '80s.

The men who seek what they call "bareback sex" - a term that evokes the daredevil world of rodeo stunts - are often HIV-positive and make no secret

about it. In fact, most men joining the ranks of the barebacking movement have been positive for years and readily have unprotected anal sex with HIV-negative partners. Not surprisingly, the bareback scene is stirring up a lot of controversy.

The number of recent articles and books written on the subjects of gay male promiscuity and bareback sex could fill a warehouse. Gay pundits such as Michelangelo Signorile, Gabriel Rotello and Larry Kramer have chimed in with books denouncing the emerging subculture of bareback sex, while the barebackers themselves have taken to the Internet to spread their message more subtly. But it's not just the fact that HIV-positive gay men are having sex without condoms that is fueling a national debate, it is more their emergence as a very vocal, but strangely invisible, subculture and the unsettling gospel they preach.

Although unprotected anal sex is nothing new - men have been doing it throughout the AIDS epidemic - it has only been in the last year or so that men into bareback sex have started to organize. By creating a network of Web sites,

newsgroups and mailing lists on the Internet, barebackers in all parts of the world can regularly meet to cruise for potential sex partners in almost complete anonymity.

The bareback scene appears to have started with some HIV-positive men who felt they had nothing to lose in having sex without condoms with other HIV-positive men. They're already infected, right?

In fact, unprotected sex between HIVpositive men is dangerous for a number of reasons. With a number of strains of the human immunodeficiency virus floating around, and each one attacking the body in a different way, the risk of being infected with a new strain through unprotected sex is very high. And the more virus you get in the body, the sicker you become. Moreover, this mixing of various HIV strains can make protease inhibitors and other antiviral drugs ineffective, and passing them on to another person, even one already infected with the virus, can make him resistant to drugs that could have helped him. AIDS educators are understandably worried about the effects this increase in risky behavior will have on the epidemic.

Coming Together on the 'Net

Started by a group of like-minded men who bonded last year on the mega-

"Guess what? We're not gay. You're going to get jacked. It's gay awareness week," DeBree testified, relating what McKinney later boasted of saying to Shepard.

McKinney, who showed no emotion during testimony Thursday from five Laramie or Albany County officers, was the only defendant in the case to go through a preliminary hearing.

Henderson, his co-defendant, waived his hearing on the same charges and will be arraigned next month in district court.

Kristen Price, McKinney's 18-year-old girlfriend, and Henderson's girlfriend, Chasity Pasley, 20, also waived preliminary hearings and face arraignment next month on accessory charges.

Albany County Attorney Cal Rerucha refused Thursday to say if he would seek the death penalty against either McKinney or Henderson. Matthew Shepard's parents, Dennis and Judy, attended the preliminary hearing Thursday, but Dennis Shepard waved off reporters. The Shepards sat three rows in front of McKinney's family in a courtroom that drew more media than spectators.

New details emerged Thursday about the case:

Laramie police contacted McKinney and Henderson before 1 a.m. Oct. 7 after the pair confronted two teen-agers

on a street near Shepard's home, which they intended to burglarize. Police initially responded to the area on a report of vandalism after one of the two teens involved in the altercation with Henderson and McKinney slashed the tire of a parked car.

Police who questioned McKinney and Henderson that night spotted a pistol in the pickup truck the pair was driving. The pistol was covered in blood and appeared to have hairs stuck to it, Laramie police Cmdr. Dave O'Malley testified. Police later recovered Shepard's credit card and his size 7 shoes from the truck, along with a blood-spattered coat that belonged to Henderson.

Price recounted in an interview with Laramie police Detective Ben Fritzen what McKinnov told her about the night of

what McKinney told her about the night of Oct. 6. He said he was "pretty sure

he killed a guy," Fritzen testified. Henderson laughed as McKinney struck Shepard after they led him to a fence

line on the outskirts of Laramie. "He (Shepard) was basically begging, asking them to stop, saying they were hurting him, to stop and to let him go," Fritzen testified, recounting his interview with Price. Shepard's shoes were taken, although McKinney "originally had considered stripping him down to his underwear."

CUT TAXES! BE PREPARED

With the end of the year in sight. April 30th's tax deadline is not so far ahead. Nearly 1/3 of all Canadians operate a small business whether it be at home or elsewhere. There are several key areas one should look at by December 31st that will maximize your deductions and reduce taxes owing.

CAR DEDUCTIONS

In order to deduct the use of your car you need to calculate the percentage of use as it relates to the business. To do this use a travel log to calculate the total km driven for business use. Based on the odometer readings calculate the total km driven for the year by subtracting the fair market value.

Many business people do

not have a travel log. It is recommended that you use your appointment book as a reminder of the business stops you made and don't forget trips to the post office or the office supply store. Estimate the total km travelled with this information, estimate the personal usage of the vehicle to determine the total km driven for the year. (Note: Be sure to record the odometer reading at the beginning of the year)

Be sure to keep all gas. maintenance, parking and car wash receipts. You can also deduct a portion of the interest paid on a loan for a new vehicle. licences and insurance. If you lease the vehicle, be sure to have a copy of the lease. You may be able to claim an amount for depreciation on the vehicle, to make this claim you need to know the cost of the vehicle or the fair market value.

Economical Tax Services offers at no charge. 12 monthly travel log to keep track of mileage.

HOME OFFICE DEDUCTION

You need to know how much space vou use in your home as 'work space'

You can only make a claim only if you realize a profit. You cannot deduct any home expenses if you have a loss or create a loss with home expenses.

Be sure to know how much interest you paid on your mortgage, utilities, maintenance and repairs, rental payments (if any), insurance and property taxes.

TELEPHONE **EXPENSES**

If you have one phone line, you cannot claim the monthly service charges. You can claim any

charges for long distance calls or any special features you have obtained to handle calls. For example: ident-a-call, mailboxes for the business.

If you have a business line for the home, you must deduct personal calls from the amount owing.

Note: The same rules apply to cellular phones.

EQUIPMENT AND FURNITURE PURCHASES

You may be able to claim an amount for depreciation (also known as capital cost allowance) on all assets purchases over \$200.00. CCA is a percentage of the value of the asset and is set by Revenue Canada for different items.

For example: Computers are depreciated at 30%.

Keep a separate file of all equipment and furniture purchases.

Note: In the vear of purchase you

can only claim half of the allowabe CCA permitted. If you purchased a computer at any time in 1998 you are permitted to claim only 15 percent.

INTEREST **EXPENSE**

Interest you pay on charge cards can also be deducted. If you use one card exclusively for business, those finance charges are 100% deductible. If your card is used for both personal and business expenses the interest must be prorated.

HEALTH INSURANCE **PREMIUMS**

Premiums paid to a private health plan on behalf of yourself, employees, spouse or children may

be made as a business deduction. Payments are deductible to a maximum of \$1,500,00 for each of the self-employed person and his/her spouse AND \$750.00 per child (assuming there are no full-time employees)

Before consulting your income-tax preparer or accountant, have all you receipts, invoices, cheque studs and any information organized, to substantiate a claim. It will save you money on your final billing for services. If you don't have the time to do organize your receipts make an appointment to bring your 'shoebox' to your tax-preparer or accountant in January or early February. Note: Procrastination could cost you more in services.





"Marrying Apartheid" by by Steve Bryant & Demian

In the wake of anti-gay votes and continuing opposition to legal marriage for same-sex couples, some activists have advocated "reciprocal benefit" or "domestic partnership" plans as a more attainable objective. Partners Task Force for Gay & Lesbian Couples opposes that course for reasons of both strategy and principle. We instead advocate continuing the pressure for the fully equal civil right of legal marriage.

Domestic partnership, at first glance, seems an attractive alternative. It appears more winnable -- even opponents of legal, same-sex marriage have rhetorically proposed it as a "lesser evil." It nonetheless represents a system of apartheid, less heinous than South Africa's, but similar in principle. It is plainly designed to treat one group of citizens in a separate and inferior manner despite their identical circumstances.

Many churches apply the same logic when they perform a marriage ceremony for an opposite-sex couple and call it a "marriage," then employ an identical ceremony for a same-sex couple and call it a "union." It's apartheid.

Nowhere in the world are same-sex couples accorded legal marriage rights, not even in Denmark, Greenland, Iceland, Netherlands, Norway and Sweden, where they have laws allowing for "Registered Partnerships." Same-sex couples are accorded nearly every right of marriage, excluding adoption and the right to be married in the state church. But while their apartheid is a generous one, it remains separate, unequal and therefore demeaning.

In the United States, domestic partnership programs have amounted to little more than tokenism. For example, consider the inequitable barriers to workplace health coverage for domestic partners, the most valuable benefits so far accorded. In order to qualify, many plans require a signed affidavit stating that the partners live together and are "mutually responsible for each other's economic welfare." Some require that the relationship exist for a given length of time. Legally married couples applying for benefits face none of these requirements.

To be comparable to legal marriage, a domestic partnership policy would need to provide for 150-to-350 rights and responsibilities, depending on the couple's state of residence. Further, it would need to activate at least 1,049 federally regulated rights and responsibilities that are triggered by legal marriage. Furthermore, these benefits would need to be portable so that partnerships remain valid when crossing state lines. Otherwise, a couple's right to hospital visitation would be rendered invalid should they have an accident while traveling out-of-state.

Surely politicians supporting domestic partner benefits as a compromise have in mind only modest handouts -- not the whole package. Practically speaking, a complete domestic partnership plan is highly unlikely, simply because of the number and complexity of laws. Further, if we manage to replicate all of the provisions of legal marriage, why then call it something other than "marriage"?



BOOK REVIEW: "THE SHARED HEART" - 40 PERSONAL STORIES

ROMANTIC STORIES 'BUILD A BRIDGE' FOR GAYS, LESBIANS by SUE CORBETT

The Shared Heart, a collection of 40 personal stories about romance and first loves, brims with life-affirming testimony, and its striking, black-and-white photographs portray an ethnically interesting mix of attractive, young faces.

But what makes this book a landmark of sorts is that the teenagers and 20somethings profiled are gay, lesbian and bisexual.

Their candor in talking about their sexuality is not only novel, it would have been impossible 20 years ago. When the book's author, Adam Mastoon, was a teenager in the 1970s, he was too terrified of his own feelings to speak about them.

"The silence and the lack of any positive image of other gay or lesbian people communicated to me that the feelings I was having must be very wrong," Mastoon recalled. 'The Shared Heart' is my way of building a bridge to others who feel that sense of aloneness."

It's a bridge no one person could have built. The road to a book whose subtitle is Celebrating Lesbian, Gay and Bisexual Young People was paved by the gay-rights crusaders who often paid a heavy price for their sexuality.

But even as acceptance of gay and lesbian people has grown, a murder in Wyoming becomes a wrenching reminder of the intolerance that routinely led to violence in the not-so-distant past. For teenagers confused about their own sexuality, Matthew Shepard's brutal death last month can only lead to more soul-searching.

In that search, it's comforting to see how gay and lesbian characters have evolved in literature for young audiences. The canon is still relatively thin. It has been less than 30 years since the first book appeared with a scene that challenged the taboo: John Donovan's I'll Get There, It Better Be Worth the Trip, in which two 13-year-old boys unexpectedly find they are sexually attracted to each other.

It was another 15 years until gay and lesbian characters starred in young adult literature or moved beyond stereotypes. A groundbreaking work was Nancy Garden's Annie On My Mind, a sensitive portrayal of a teen love affair between two girls, published in 1982.

Before Liza loved Annie and Annie loved her in return, gay and lesbian love had nearly always ended badly, if not tragically, in freak accidents or car crashes, said Roger Sutton, author of Hearing Us Out: Voices from the Gay and Lesbian Community.

"Gay and lesbian people were the worst drivers this side of the Mississippi," Sutton said. With homophobia at the wheel, Sutton says, these early books did not do much to assuage fear in the reader.

"If you were a young gay kid reading these books, you couldn't help but feel you had a dangerous life ahead of you," he said.

Though gay characters stopped dying off, throughout the 1980s authors

continued to struggle with how to sensitively portray the gay or lesbian experience in books that teenagers would read.

Sexual awakening has always been a touchy subject with parents and for school librarians; homosexual awakening was a brave new world.

As a result, gay characters in books in the early 1980s were marginalized and often functioned as sidekicks or minor players, for comic relief or as a sop to liberal sentiments. When the subject of the book itself was homosexuality, gayness was often presented as a disability or as something that could be overcome.

Christine Jenkins, an assistant professor of library science at the University of Illinois and an expert on the evolution of gay characters in young adult novels, recalls a spate of 1980s-era novels in which girls fell for studly boys, who turned out (gasp!) to be gay, and a subgenre, which she calls the "girls' boarding schools" stories.

"In these books, a girl would go off to boarding school or summer camp and be seduced by some vampy temptress but by the end she had learned her lesson," and was no longer homosexual, Jenkins said. "Just because you did it once didn't mean you would do it again."

By the end of the 1980s, the form began to mature. Barbara Wesba's Crazy Vanilla featured the first portrayal of the gay community.

Ron Koertge's The Arizona Kid made waves as the first "gay comedy." It's a what-I-did-on-my-summer-vacation story in which a 16-year-old spends his vacation with a uncle he doesn't know well.

The uncle is openly gay, but his sexual orientation is not the story itself. "He's just part of the passing parade of things that happen in this story," Jenkins notes. Since 1989, several novels have moved beyond the standard coming-out story.

Francesca Lia Block's Weetzie Bat series about punk life, M.E. Kerr's Deliver Us From Evie and Rodger Larson's What I Know Now are all stellar stories that include gay characters, explore the issues central to their lives and resist pat resolutions.

"We're past the stage of the 'problem' novel now," said Jenkins. "Being gay or lesbian isn't portrayed as the terrible, terrible secret which it used to be. Now it's presented as 'There's one more thing you should know about my best friend.'

These books laid the groundwork for a book like The Shared Heart, which, despite its potential for controversy, has been warmly embraced by school librarians.

School Library Journal, the magazine whose reviews of books greatly influences which books will get purchased, gave Mastoon's book its top rating. His photographs on which the book is based were prominently displayed at the American Library Association's annual convention this summer and he's making arrangements to take the exhibit to the University of Wyoming.

"I would venture to guess that the people who killed Matthew Shepard don't know a single gay or lesbian person and what we don't know, we're afraid of," Mastoon said. The Shared Heart is a window through which we can see the ways we are the same."



Pigbotm, a North Dallas software engineer who declines to reveal his real name, says in the site's introductory pages that he wanted to extend the men's newfound sense of community by creating a Web page.

Xtreme Sex doesn't sugarcoat its mission to provide a forum for HIV-positive gay males interested in unprotected sex. Its banner advertisements have shocking headlines like "Get an Education Fuck a Student" and "Poz Cum - the Fuck of Death." It's this frankness that has caused many gay leaders and at least two major gay newspapers to blast the site.

Chicago's Windy City Times and the Dallas Voice have declared an all-out war against the site, saying that it is leading men to their deaths by promoting unsafe sex. But not all people feel that the site is evil. One HIV-positive member sang the site's praises in a message board posting: "You have helped me in showing me that there is life after all this. ... Thank you for once again giving me back the freedom that I felt had been taken away from me."

While Xtreme Sex caters to HIV-positive men interested in condomless fluid exchange, the second most popular hang-out for barebackers on the 'Net was originally designed for men inter

ested in sex with other men, period. Sponsored by the adult Web site Bedfellow, cruisingforsex.com is the official "Web site for men looking to know where to meet men for sex." The site lists places where men can find glory holes and other meeting grounds for sex in every state and every major university. The site also hosts chat rooms, editorials, reviews of personal home pages, and entrapment alerts.

Cruising for sex.com has also been the target of the police, who regularly monitor postings to the site in efforts to enforce public sex laws. The site states often that it is against the practice of bareback sex in theory, but also says that barebacking is a personal choice and that it doesn't condemn barebackers themselves. The most shocking thing about this budding subculture is the small but steadily growing number of men who are HIV-negative, but come to both Web sites actually seeking to be infected. Why would anyone seek out the AIDS virus? There seems to be no satisfying answer. Pigbotm, in fact, denies that that is what is happening in most cases. He writes on his Web page that "the majority of these HIV infection requests come from men who are already HIV- positive and want to experience some sort of fantasy about being infected." HERSTORY WOMYN SPEAK



"To take our condition seriously:

black women as well as white women know that the oppression most readily acknowledged by both black and white people in America--even by those who justify and practice racism-is racial and/or class oppression. To assert women-hating as a constant fact of life both within the black community and as a fact of white women's lives, for both black and white feminists, taking an immense and courageous step bevond past political postitions, old analyses of power and powerlessness. The dismissal or postponement 'women's issues' (as if 'women's issues' were not central human issues) 'by radical' and 'revolutionary' groups is part of the mass psychology of male supremacism: women have accepted it at all is a measure of our indoctrinated self-denial. It is that same self-denial which has allowed us to endure without protest the spiritual nausea induced in us by jokes about old

maids, mothers-inlaw, Jewish mothers, dvkes, prostitutes; by pornography; by the daily bulletins of male violence against women; by our knowledge that men we have nurtured, supported, and done time for were not our spiritual and emotional equals, and that our selfhood, our womanhood itself, has been comtemptible or terrifying to them. The anger and pain aroused in us by language, images, acts that defame and destroy woman has taken three forms: compassion (for our rapists and batterers, not for each other); denial and laughter (boys will be boys: a sense of humor is so important); all the old, and tangled rage of woman vs. woman. To permit ourselves to acknowledge the depth of woman-hatred that is counted, tolerated, and justified in everyday life is frightening; yet somewhere, we all know it, and I believe that as this fear becomes more conscious it also behealthier. comes Unanalyzed pain leads us

to numbness, subservience, all to random and ineffectual bursts of violence. As separate individuals, woman have rarely been in a position to use our pain and anger as a creative force for change. Most women have not even been able to touch this anger, except to drive it inward like a rusted nail.

To the extent that I can imagine being a black woman, a black feminist. I can imagine carrying a particular fear in me: that white feminists, and other white women who have 'changed their lives' in the light of the feminst movement, might still possess the capacity to delude themselves into some compromise of inclusion into patriarchy, into the white male order. That they and (we) would not emotionally believe what they (we) intellectually profess as to the need for an end to patriarchy. That their (our) physical, genetic knowledge would fail to rise like warning nausea where selective treatment of

prizes. 'life-style liberation,' personal solutions, to the few -- and those few. overwhelmingly white. That they (we) would not recognize the forms of suicide we have practiced in the past, under their newest guises. (The first woman to be cloned? The first Lesbian Secretary of State? The First Mother on the Moon?) That, unable or unwilling to fathom the destructiveness of racism as black people live it, they (we) will also fail to fathom the violence of

The contradiction, the taboos, of difference. They said to us: That flesh, darker or lighter than your own, encloses a foreign country. You cannot know it. It speaks another language, it is alien territory: otherness. At the same time they told us: You cannot find wholeness with one whose body is formed like your own, one who like you has only a clitoris, only a vulva, one who like you is in a state of lack. You must seek the opposite, The Other, Him whose difference from you means power, means

mastory. Without Him you are powerless, unfinished. With her you can only be two halves, unbalanced, mutilated, contemptible.

But in you I seek both difference and identity. We both know that women are not identical: the movement of your mind; the pulse of your orgasm; the figures in your dreams; the weapons you received from your mothers, or had to invent; the range of your hungers--I cannot intuit merely because we both are woman. And yet, there is so much I can know. What has stopped me short, what fuses my anger now, is that we were told we were utterly different, that the difference between us must be everything, must be determinative, that from that difference we each must turn away; that we must also flee from our alike-

As a lesbian/feminist, what can passive subservience to those orders mean to me, but that I passively consent to remain an instrument of men, who have profited from slavery, imperialism, and forced heterosexuality and motherhood, organized prostitution and pornography, and a

separation from each other? What can obedience to those orders mean, but that my woman-identification is mere 'sexual preference', my erotic self still distorted and constrained?

As I thrust my hand deeper into the swirl of the stream--history, nightmare, accountability--I feel the current angrier and more multiform than the surface shows: There is fury here, and terror, but there is also power, power not to be had without the terror and the fury. We need to go beyond rhetoric or evasion into that place in ourselves. to fill the force of all we have been trying-without success--to skim across.

The Poet Sappho

One of the great Greek lyrists and few known female poets of the ancient world, Sappho was born some time between 630 and 612 BC. She was an aristocrat

who married a prosperous merchant, and she had a daughter named Cleis. Her wealth afforded her with the opportunity to live her life as she chose, and she chose to spend it studying the arts on the isle of Lesbos.

In the seventh century BC, Lesbos was a cultural center. Sappho spent most her time on the island, though she also traveled widely throughout Greece.


She was exiled for a time because of political activities in her family, and she spent this time in Sicily. By this time she was known as a poet, and the residents of Syracuse were so honored by her visit that they erected a statue to her.

Sappho was called a lyrist because, as was the custom of the time, she wrote her poems to be performed with the accompaniment of a lyre. Sappho composed her own music and refined the prevailing lyric meter to a point that it is now known as sapphic meter. She innovated lyric poetry both in technique and style, becoming part of a new wave of Greek lyrists who moved from writing poetry from the point of view of gods and muses to the personal vantage point of the individual. She was one of the first poets to write from the first person, describing love and loss as it affected her personally.

Her style was sensual and melodic; primarily songs of love, yearning, and re-

flection. Most commonly the target of her affections was female, often one of the many women sent to her for education in the arts. She nurtured these women, wrote poems of love and adoration to them, and when they eventually left

the island to be married, she composed their wedding songs.



mous with woman-love that two of the most popular words to describe female homosexuality--lesbian and sapphic have derived from her.

How well was Sappho honored in ancient times? While she still lived, coins of Lesbos were minted with her image. Plato elevated her from the status of great lyric poet to one of the muses. Upon hearing one of the songs, Solon, an Athenian ruler, lawyer, and a poet himself, asked that he be taught the song "Because I want to learn it and die."


In more modern times, many poets have been inspired by her works. Michael Field, Pierre Louys, Renée Vivien, Marie-Madeleine, Amy Lowell, and H.D. all cited Sappho as a strong influence on their work. Given the fame that her work has enjoyed, it is somewhat surprising to learn that only one of

Sappho's poems is available in its entirety--all of the rest exist as fragments

of her original work. At one time, there were perhaps nine complete volumes of her poetry, but over the centuries, from neglect, natural disasters, and possibly some censorship by close-minded scholars, her work was lost. Late in the 19th century, however, manuscripts dating back to the eighth century AD were discovered in the Nile Valley, and some of these manuscripts proved to contained Sappho's work. Excavations that followed in ancient Egyptian refuse heaps unearthed a quantity of papyruses from the first century BC to the 10th century AD. Here, strips of papyrus--some containing her poetry--were found in number. These strips had been used to wrap mummies, stuff sacred animals, and wrap coffins. The work to piece these together and identify them has continued into the twentieth century.

Many translations of these fragments are available today, with each of these translations offering a different approach to her work. Translating Sappho's poetry is challenging, partly because of the fragmented nature of the material. In reconstructing a poem, the translator must either trail off into oblivion periodically, or speculate on the missing pieces and take the risk (for the sake of lyric flow) of introducing elements that Sappho did not intend. Breaks in the poem can affect the intact lines, as well, robbing them of critical context. Even with the complication of fragments aside. a translator still has to decide how to translate the ancient Greek text, where to insert line breaks, how to stress each word, and any number of technical details that affect the meaning and the lyricism of the resulting poem. It makes sense, then, for those who are interested in Sappho's work (and not fluent in ancient Greek) to read multiple translations to obtain several viewpoints. From ancient times to today, Sappho has

remained an important literary and cultural figure. Her works continued to be studied and translated, new poets are inspired by her constantly, and speculation on her life remains popular in the form of fictionalized tales and ardent research. For a woman who has been dead for over two thousand years, this is quite an achievement.

attitudes or apathy cannot only create, but also excuse monstrous and evil actions. One striking and tragic example of this was the recent murder of Matthew Shepard. We can only hope increased tolerance and acceptance eventually comes about from this horror. Even though it is extremely difficult, maybe even impossible at this time. we need to also extend kindness to those responsible for this hideous crime. This does not mean excusing, but understanding if we can, what led them to allow themselves to become what they have. But the HIV-negative ranks of the barebacking movement are not only made up of those seeking HIV infection. Members of another similarly growing group have no desire to become HIVpositive, but are still flocking to Xtreme Sex's message boards and its members' bareback parties. It's not that these HIV- negative barebackers don't know about the life-ordeath consequences of their actions. A surprisingly high number of negative barebackers have already seen a friend or partner die from the disease. They come purely for the thrill of raw sex.

"I do think about it a lot as I'm HIV-negative & plan to stay that way," reads a typical member's posting to the boards at Xtreme Sex. "No one cums in me & the only cum I eat is mine. I bareback top only. My lover died of AIDS. I went through the whole thing, ending in wasting syndrome and a fatal bout with PCP. Barebacking is

definitely not wise, but we are looking for a type of intimacy that doesn't frequently happen since AIDS."

Who Are These People?

The slew of articles written on the subject imply that the group of men identifying themselves as barebackers is made up primarily of young party boys in their 20s who are anxious to travel back to a time when the love was free and the party never ended. But this is not necessary true.

On the Queer Bareback list, an e-mail list that boasts over 500 men from around the world as members, barebackers come together to discuss where they can find willing sex partners and to read announcements of area sex parties. Although the twentysomething circuit party crowd is represented, it is men in their 30s, 40s, and 50s that make up the majority of the participants. And they are not only from gay Meccas like New York. Los Angeles, San Fran-

cisco. and Miami. Barebackers from Phoenix, Knoxville, Dallas, Memphis, Cincinnati - and yes, even Baltimore have signed on, as well as men from practically every other major city in the country. Barebacking is not even a uniquely American phenomenon. as the presence of men from England, Germany, Holland, Australia and Nigeria would attest.

Besides their dislike of condoms, a common thread that binds the world's barebackers is a deep resentment toward any authority figure, be it the government, the Centers for Disease Control, the police or their parents.

Responsible Barebacking?

Despite their lack of trust in the medical and pharmaceutical industries, some barebackers are in fact concerned with their own health and the health of their sexual partners. Mark J., a medical professional at a hospital in Baltimore, regularly posts messages on the moral-

ity of barebacking, stressing that HIV status should be discussed with sex partners.

"There are lots of un-

knowns about the trans-

mission of HIV, and a large number of uninformed men out there." Mark J. recently wrote. "I think that it is perfectly acceptable, if not a reguirement, to talk about the methods of transmission and the risks. A young guy new to the gay scene, living in Podunk, USA, may not have had the access that the rest of us have had to the current literature and science and medicine of HIV. He might just stumble on a bareback Web site or mailing list one day and see all these other guys having wonderful, unprotected sex. If he jumps headfirst into barebacking without understanding the risks, he will be committing suicide."

Why Do They Do It?

The word intimacy comes up often on in online discussions. Barebackers post message after message about

the joys of going condomfree and how it is a way of reclaiming some lost right of passage, a concept that is difficult, they admit, for others to understand.

In the June 1997 issue of POZ Magazine, Stephen Gendin tried to explain the appeal of bareback sex to the publication's readers.

"I can't comment on a negative guy's decision to go raw, but for us positive men, the benefits are obvious," Gendin wrote. "The physical sensation is much better. The connection feels closer and more intimate. The sharing of cum on the physical level heightens the sense of sharing on the emotional and spiritual planes. ... How do I justify pursuing acts with other positive men that many would describe as callous, even malicious? Am I quilty of skirting the facts in pursuit of pleasure? Or is the reinfection science shaky enough that it's not irrational for positive men to go skin-to-skin? With the risks so hazy and the benefits so brilliantly clear, no wonder riding bareback is all the rage. For me, being infected in the first place is such a doomful event that any act that brings pleasure, even a risky one, is worth grabbing for."

But most barebackers say it is no one's business why they choose to lose the latex. They claim it is an individual choice and and AIDS has no place in the barebacking culture.

"I bareback because I like it and don't give a shit about HIV," writes Gary Bryant of San Francisco when questioned about his reasons for barebacking.

"It's my personal decision and I don't need a bunch of verbal masturbation from guys who are still unsure, or who think their choice not to bareback is universal law," he asserts. "Everyone has their own opinion on AIDS and what they feel are acceptable risks.




