




Matthew Shepard For: TIME'S MAN OF THE YEAR? by A.J. Mahari

While many of you have likely already heard, Time Magazine held an online poll regarding who the Internet community thought should be their "Man of the Year" (results were announced December 20,). While there's no clear indication how much weight Time will give to this poll, Matt, at times did hold the lead. People, on the internet were encouraged to visit the page and to vote for Matthew Sheppard by different web sites and many messages to different email lists. Matthew Shepard's name was not on the Time list of choices but they did have a place

Each December since 1927, TIME has selected the "Man of the Year," the person who most shook up our world during the previous 12 months. some cases, the choice has been symbolic or in



animate, such as "Endangered Earth" in 1988 and "American Women" in 1976. What headline grabber should take the prize this year? Monica Lewinsky or Kenneth Starr? The Internet or Viagra? Saddam Hussein or Alan Greenspan?"

Many across the internet were debating the issue of voting for Matthew Shepard. Locally, in Kitchener-Waterloo, Cambridge and Guelph, particpants of our local email list had the following to say about Matthew Shepard and Time's "Man Of The Year Poll":

(Re-printed with the permission of the authors of the email posts)

"I have to put my 2cents in here at this point. While I found what happened to Matthew Shepard to be horrendous and appalling, I find how we as North Americans have reacted to it even worse. How many people have been brutally murdered today let alone in the last 12 months? Why have you not nominated them as Time's 1998 Man of the

Year? Yes, Matthew was a gay man that was killed because he was gay, but what of the other gay men and women that have been killed for the same reason this year? We tend to take one news item and blow it up to point where the story being told is out shadowed by the story of the story being told. My question to people is "how has the killing of Matthew Shepard 'shook up' our world?"--Scott S.

Mandi then responded to Scott by saying: "Time for my two cents: I know that people are killed every year due to their sexual orientation, 95% of the time, it's not in the news, or reported. When it is, it should be talked about, and people should know why it's wrong. By putting Matthew up for man of the year award, it shows that there is a support out thereof the queer community, and the fact that he is at number one right now makes me feel warm and safe inside. I know that the harsh reality is that maybe some of the people who are voting are only doing so because it's popular to

support the queer community right now because of the murder, but the thing you forget is that by having the opportunity to vote, those who are supportive of the community, but too afraid to do anvthing about it, are given a shot at showing their support, no matter how small it is. We can't condemn people for acknowledging only one of several murders. It's a start. Awareness needs to start somewhere.

Scott then replied to Mandi: "I am not condemning people for acknowledging only one of several murders: I am trving to get people to think about them. By asking, "how has Matthew Shepard's murder "shook up" our world?" I hope that people will stop and think about it. I am asking people to think about the issues involved before you vote for Matthew Shepard as Time's 1998 Man of the Year. Yes. Awareness needs to start somewhere, but it has to continue on to the next step for it to do any good. We get hung up on the issue that everyone is talking about and nothing further gets done.

My point is, I feel for Matthew Shepard and all the people that cared for him, and I do hope that this tragedy will help to bring light to the problems. However, I would like to acknowledge all that have fallen before and those that will fall over this issue. It is up to us to continually bring these issues into the open and make people think about them all the time not just when a person is killed over them.

M, then added: "Well, it

gave us a martyr, where we've neglected to notice others before. It shook us up as a community to feel fear again, or renewed fear. It reeks, to me, of selective uprisings of emotion. Think of the case in oregon where a lesbian and disabled man were firebombed. Think of the Bottoms' case in the States. Think of Brandon and think of the endless number of crimes against queerfolk. Matthew Sheppard is a part of that, but he is not representative of it in the least."

Dave Callandar, (of Out And About Radio) who sent the original message to the email list to inform its members about the "Time Man of the Year" poll responded with: "I think a lot of people are missing the bloody point about nominating Matthew Shephard for man of the year. I'm quite well aware that all of us face homophobia everyday,

and that there is no reason to martyr someone, placing him above all other queer folk. BUT.... Wouldn't it be nice for ONCE to see a huge national magazine say that they're story of the year has to do with the inequality and hate we all face? Wouldn't it be nice for Time to say "Queer rights and hate crimes against gay people are THE major story of 1998".

Here are some of the other people, and STO-RIES for that matter, that are also nominated... President Clinton, Monica Lewinski, Saddam Hussein, and VIAGRA. I don't know about you, but given a choice between Monica, Viagra, and Mat Shepherd, I pick the one that gets one of our stories out in front of mainstream culture. As Harvey Fierstein is so fond of saying "Visibility at any cost"

Hans wrote: "I am in total agreement with David. I think the whole tragedy discredited the religous right, because many straight people saw how incredibly insensitive it was of them to be protesting with those horrible signs at his funeral. He was killed because he was gay, would that not make him representative for hate crimes to some extent?"

sexual issues...in fact homophobic in its attitudes towards us! A matter you may want to address in a forthcoming issue???

In closing, the international scene is very important, but circulars like this one succeed only when containing stories on local issues. There are enough such local issues of interest to our people to justify their inclusion in your work. Hopefully this will happen as your readership grows.

Well, again, good luck! With the mix of people in our fairy town, you'll need it.

Two Women Deny Role In Killing Of Gay Student

SEPARATE TRIALS, AND DATES SET

Separate Trials in Gay Attack Associated Press December 10, 1998 LARAMIE, Wyo. (AP) -- The two men accused of killing gay student Matthew Shepard will be tried separately, a judge ruled Thursday. District Judge Jeffrey Donnell gave no reason for the decision regarding Russell Arthur Henderson and Aaron James McKinney.

Prosecutors wanted a single trial, claiming two people accused of the same crime should be tried together. Defense attorneys opposed a combined trial but would not say why publicly. Thursday's hearing was closed to the public.

Henderson's trial was set for March 22, McKinney's for Aug. 9. The two are accused of beating and robbing Shepard on Oct. 7 and tying him

to a fence outside Laramie. The University of Wyoming student died days later. Investigators said he was targeted in part because he was gay.

The men's girlfriends are charged with helping them dispose of evidence. Their trial dates have not been set.

Death Penalty Sought

LARAMIE, Wyo. (AP)

Prosecutors said Monday they'll seek the death penalty against the two men accused in the beating death of a gay University of Wyoming student. Aaron James McKinney and Russell Arthur Henderson, both 21, are accused of luring Matthew Shepard, also 21. out of a downtown bar. Police say the two robbed and pistol-whipped the 105-pound freshman, tied him to a log fence and beat him into unconsciousness. Shepard died Oct. 12, five days later. Shepard's murder brought condemnation from President Clinton. who renewed a call to expand the federal hate crimes law to include crimes based on a victim's sexual orientation, gender or disability.

LARAMIE, Wyo. -

The girlfriends of two men charged in the beating death of gay college student Matthew Shepard pleaded not guilty Wednesday to helping the men dispose of evidence.

Chasity Vera Pasley, 20, and Kristen LeAnn Price, 19, both of Laramie, are accused of helping to dispose of bloody clothing that police say was worn by Pasley's boyfriend, Russell Arthur Henderson, 21.

District Judge Jeffrey A. Donnell did not set a trial date for either woman.

Henderson and Aaron James McKinney, 21, both of Laramie, have pleaded not guilty to firstdegree murder, kidnapping, and aggravated robbery and are awaiting trial.

Pasley and Price are charged with being accessories-after-the-fact to first-degree murder. The charge carries a maximum penalty of three years in prison and a fine of \$3,000.

SWISS MAN JAILED FOR HIV TRANSMIS-SION

A 51-year-old man in Winterthur, Switzerland, was jailed for three years Nov. 9 for causing serious bodily harm by passing HIV to his girlfriend whom he had not told he was HIV-positive.

Prosecutors sought to have the man jailed for 10 years but the defense argued successfully that he had not acted with intent to kill.

Duluth News Tribune Cabbie charged with sex assault for the alleged rape of a lesbian passenger

A former Duluth cab driver faces two rape charges after allegedly sexually assaulting a female passenger last month, in part because of her sexual orientation.

Christopher Steven Ash, 25, of 419 N. 21st Ave. W., was charged Thursday with two counts of third-degree sexual assault in assault.

According to the criminal

complaint filed with the charges, Ash picked up the woman.

. The woman was extremely drunk and said she wanted to go to the Duluth Detoxification Center.

On the way, Ash and the woman struck up a conversation and talked about both being in the Navy. He asked her if she was gay and the victim told him she was homosexual.

According to the criminal complaint, the victim said Ash then adopted a "nasty tone of voice" and told her "I knew the minute you walked out the door; you walk like a man."

The victim said she was concerned by the tone and began to feel alarmed.

Ash is charged with one count of third-degree criminal sexual conduct for allegedly raping the woman; the second charge alleges he knew or had reason to know the victim was mentally-impaired, mentally incapacitated or physically helpless. Both charges carry a maximum sentence of 15 years and (U.S.) \$30,000 fine.

South Africa Woman Slain by Neighbors:

For "Bringing Shame On Neighborhood"

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa - A volunteer working to persuade South Africans not to discriminate against HIV-infected people was beaten to death last week by her neighbors, who accused her of bringing shame on their community by revealing that she was HIV-The killing positive. scared other anti-AIDS advocates and said it proved what they have said for years - although three million South Africans are infected with the virus that causes AIDS, nearly all are afraid to admit it because of the hostility they face.

The woman killed, Gugu Dlamini, 36, a volunteer field worker for the National Association of People Living With HIV/ AIDS went public on World AIDS Day, Dec. 1.

South Africa has the world's fastest-growing AIDS epidemic. Up to 30 percent of adults there are infected.

AUSTRALIAN AIDS DEATHS DOWN 80%

The new AIDS drug cocktails have reduced AIDS deaths 80 percent in Australia, says the National Centre in HIV Epidemiology and Clinical Research.

Researchers compared statistics from 1990-93 with those from 1994-97.

During the same period, the percentage of people progressing from HIV-positivity to full-blown AIDS also dropped, by about 50 percent.

Lesbian Poet in Running to be Poet Laureate

London England

Ursula (U A) Fanthorpe shot from nowhere to become a leading contender for the post of Poet Laureate - the Queen's official poet - when The Guardian published her poem for Prince Charles on the occasion of his 50th birthday.

Originally a 66-1 outsider, U A Fanthorpe saw the odds on her shorten dramatically to 33-1 overnight. She is currently a 16-1 contender. The Royal Society of Literature will submit a list of names to the Prime Minister, who will make the final choice early in the New Year.

LESBIAN TEEN'S HARD YEAR

Cincinnati Enquirer

The last year has been difficult for Jennie Workman.

Ms. Workman, now 18, was one of four gay, lesbian or bisexual teens featured in the Feb. 12 Enquirer.

She graduated from Sycamore High School in June.

She has enrolled at the University of Cincinnati and is majoring in child psychology.

She's still living at home but plans to move to Clifton early in 1999. She calls the neighborhood one of the few "gay-friendly" place to live in the Tristate. Ms. Workman has a new girlfriend, who's 18.

Ms. Workman's story told about her attempted suicide in ninth-grade. She felt she had nothing to live for because she would not be accepted for being a lesbian.

"I got some harassment after the article was in the paper, but most of the response was really positive said Ms. Workman, who was involved in schoolbased and city-wide support groups for gay teens.

Conference: Ending Hate Violence against Lesbians and Gays

The Lesbian and Gay Anti-Violence Project (NSW, Australia) is hosting an international conference, Ending Hate Violence against Lesbians and Gays, in Sydney at the time of the VI Gay Games in the year 2002.

It is circulating a set of draft proposals on the purpose of the conference and key planning matters. This draft paper is designed to stimulate ideas and provide a focus for discussion about the 2002 Conference. All responses and ideas about how the Sydney Host Committee goes about achieving what's in the discussion paper would be most helpful.

Responses will be received up until 28 February 1999. After which time the Sydney Host Committee will incorporate all feedback, where possible, into the plan. This document will then form the basis of a strategic plan to begin the process of planning for the conference in 2002.

SUICIDE YOUNG GAY MALES

There are statistics which show that young people who are gay commit suicide very much more frequently than other voung people. There appear to be several reasons for this.

Here we examine males since male suicide rates amongst gay youth are significantly more prevalent than those for females.

Let us look at a typical case. The individual youth has identified that he is different but maybe is unwilling to admit it to himself. At recess during elementary school, the sports and rough activity that attracted the boys in the class did not attract him. Perhaps, there was another boy to whom he wanted to talk or perhaps he preferred skipping rope or playing with the girls.

The young lad may not even realize what is going on BUT he is exhibiting the first signs of being gay. The other boys develop an attitude

towards this youth and perhaps even start to call him fag (in my day it was faerie) and ostracize him even more.

By the time the peer group is so extremely important as in puberty, the young boy is unable to relate to his peers. If he is in an environment at home or at school where it is unacceptable to be different (Dad wants him to excel at sports either because he himself excelled at those sports or because he did not have the opportunity to participate and is living through his son) the boy may withdraw and begin to believe that he is not worthy.

He still may not even realize he is gay but if he



does, he is scared to tell anyone - it is his own secret. Think of what this does to the voungster. He feels alone and afraid to be himself. The best way out is suicide. There is one other alternative - to hide from being different for all it is worth.

Note that one of the contributing factors to the boy's dilemma is his inability to communicate with peers, parents, and school authorities. How often our society isolates people but particularly over homosexuality! Those who censor books and materials used in the classroom often make it difficult for the child to see that there are acceptable alternatives. The teacher is effectively gagged.

For me, being a lesbian means three things --

First, it means that I love, cherish, and respect women in my mind, in my heart, and in my soul. This love of women is the soil in which my life is rooted. It is the soil of our common life together. My life grows out of this soil. In any other soil, I would die. In whatever ways I am strong, I am strong because of the power and passion of this nurturant love.

Second, being a lesbian means to me that there is an erotic passion and intimacy which comes of touch and taste, a wild, salty tenderness, a wet sweet sweat, our breasts, our mouths, our cunts, our intertangled hairs, our hands. I am speaking here of asensual passion as deep and mysterious as the sea, as strong and

still as the mountain, as insistent and changing as the wind.

Third, being a lesbian means to me the memory of the mother, remembered in my ownbody, sought for, desired, found, and truly honored. It means the memory of the womb, when we were



one with our mothers, until birth when we were torn asunder. It means areturn to that place inside, inside her, inside ourselves, to the tissues and membranes, to the moisture and blood.

There is a pride in the nurturant love which is our common ground, and in the sensual love, and in the memory of the mother--and that pride shines as bright as the summer sun at noon.

That pride cannot be degraded. Those who would degrade it are in the position of throwing handfuls of mud at the sun. Still it shines, and those who sling mud only dirty their own hands.

Sometimes the sun is covered by dense layers of dark clouds. A person looking up would swear that there is no sun. But still the sun shines. At night, when there is no light, still the sun shines. During rain or hail or hurricane or tornado, still the sun shines.

Does the sun ask itself. "Am I good? Am I worthwhile? Is there enough of me?" No, it burns and it shines. Does the sun ask itself, "What does the moon think of me? How does Mars feel about me today?" No, it burns, it shines. Does the sun ask itself, "Am I as big as other suns in other galaxies?" No, it burns, it shines.

In this country in the coming years. I think that there will be a terrible storm. The skies will darken bevond all recognition. Those who walk the streets will walk them in darkness. Those who are in prisons and mental institutions will not see the

sky at all, only the dark out of barred windows. Those who are hungry and in despair may not look up at all. They will see the darkness as it lies on the ground in front of their feet. Those who are raped will see the darkness as they look up into the face of the rapist. Those who are assaulted and brutalized by madmen will stare intently into the darkness to discern who is moving toward them at every moment. It will be hard to remember. as the storm is raging. that still, even though we cannot see it, the sun shines. It will be hard to

remember that still, even though we cannot see it. the sun burns. We will try to see it and we will try to feel it, and we will forget that it warms us still, that if it were not there, burning, shining, this earth would be a cold and desolate and barren place.

As long as we have life and breath, no matter how dark the earth around us, that sun still burns, still shines. There is no today without it. There is no tomorrow without it. There was no vesterday without it. That light is within us-constant, warm, and healing. Remember it, sisters, in the dark times to come.

TAKE BACK THE NIGHT

The Night and Danger 1979

© 1979, 1988, 1993 by Andrea Dworkin

"The Night and Danger" was written as a Take Back the Night speech. In New Haven, Connecticut, 2000 women marched. Street prostitutes joined the March and old women in old age homes came out on balconies with lit candles. In Old Dominion. Virginia, blacks and whites, women and men. gavs and straights, in the hundreds, joined together in the first political march ever held in Old Dominion, an oligarchal, conservative stronghold, as the name suggests. People marched fourteen miles. as if they didn't want to miss a footpath, under threat of losing their jobs and with the threat of police violence. In Calgary, Canada, women were arrested for demonstrating without a permit, the irony that a March is the safest way (arrests notwithstanding) for women to go out at night lost on the police but not on the women. In Los Angeles, California, the tail end of a double line of 2000 women walking on sidewalks was attacked by men in cars.



The Quotable Lesbian Lesbian Activism:

"We are always in a political movement, but not always in a political movement phase of a political culture" (Sarah Hoagland, 1996).

Lesbianism as Resistance

"For a woman to be a lesbian in a male-supremacist, capitalist, misogynist, racist, homophobic, imperialist culture, such as that of North America, is an act of resistance" (Cheryl Clarke, 1981)

Lesbian Chic:

"The recent flurry of articles on hip lesbians isn't about documentation...it's about creation: building a better lesbian, one palatable enough for mainstream consumption...to gain legitimacy and be taken seriously in the 1990s, cultures outside the mainstream must

prove they are free of the disruptive nature and threatening intent of activisms past..." (Judith Schwartz, quoted in Cragin, 1997)

Lesbian Feminism:

"Lesbian feminism proceeds from an analysis of gender interests which situates lesbians primarily as women rather than homosexuals, thus distinquishing it from gay theory which proceeds from an analysis of sexual identity and interests (a difference noted by Eve Sedwick). [Lesbian feminism] also bases itself in the primacy of identity, distinguishing it further from queer theory which lays primary emphasis on actions and performance." (Bonnie Zimmerman, 1996).

Lesbian Feminists:

"Lesbians of the 70s, can be divided into lesbian feminists and feminist lesbians. The former usually 'came out' after being exposed to feminism and had a history of heterosexuality. The latter were usually lifelong or long-time lesbians with little or no heterosexual history, who integrated feminism into their identity. These differing paths to lesbianism were an important

factor behind the ideological contests and the lesbian civil wars of the 70s" (Y. Retter, 1998).

"Lesbian feminists are the bad girls who fail to love the male frame of mind that currently dominates gay and lesbian studies" (Sheila Jeffreys, 1994).

Lesbian History:

"As a woman, as a lesbian, as a Jew, much of what I call history, others will not. But answering that challenge of exclusion is the work of a lifetime" (Joan Nestle, 1987).

"Lesbian history is underresearched and undertheorized" (Martha Vicinus, 1994).

Lesbian Invisibility:

"Between the time of Sappho and the birth of Natalie Clifford Barney (between ca 613 bc and 1876 ad) lies a 'lesbian silence' of twenty-four centuries" (Bertha Harris In Our Right To Love, 1978). "Without a visual identity, we have no community, no support network, no movement. Making ourselves visible is a political act, making ourselves visible is a continual process." (Joan E. Biren in Visual

Communication, 1983).

Lesbian Persistence:

"Lesbian supression is so strong that if it weren't inherent in some, it would have dissappeared [!]" (Marilyn Frye, 1996).

Cultural Feminism-Lesbianism:

"Cultural feminism represents a retreat from the difficulties of political struggle into the self-validation that community-building offers. It further substitutes the fantasy of a united sisterhood for political heory" (Alice Echols, quoted in Howard, 1997).

Intersections of Oppression:

"The concept of the simultaneity of oppression is still the crux of a Black feminist understanding of political reality...and is one of the most significant ideological contributions of Black feminist thought" (Barbara Smith, 1983, xxxii).

"The modifier 'multiple' refers not only to several, simultaneous oppressions, but to the multiplicative relationships among them as well" (Deborah King, 1988, 47).

Queer Theory and Politics:

"The wholesale embracing of theatrical metaphor [in queer theory] denies the historicity of all lesbian roles, and their specific meanings at different historical times" (Martha Vicinus, 1994)

Lesbians about Women:





HIS-STORY

BEARS A SUB-CULTURE



The most obvious characteristic of a bear is understandibly his facial fur. So, that is the most logical place to begin. Using a capital "B" to denote "BEAR", we have added a sub-class characterizing "beard type" which combines a bear's beard's length, thickness, and overall "keptness", numbered from 0 to 9 and defined in the following way:

0 --Little/no beard, or incredibly sparse-- Such a beard is the absolute minimum that could ever be classified as a beard. We're talking 5-o'clock shadow, here! And yes, we are of the opinon that the beardless can still find company among the ursines!

1-- VERY slight beard-This is the kind of beard that people have who want to have a beard, but can't grow one. Or someone who is contantly at the 1-week phase.

2 - - Slight beard -- A beard

kept VERY short at all times, or thinned out.

3 --Thin beard-- A beard in all respects but kept thin and short.

4--Mostly full-- A beard that is full except for a few noticable bald spots, or kept trimmed.

5 --Full beard-- A full beard not generally trimmed, though not generally bushy. May have a few bald spots on inspection. Usually full and roundish beards fall into this category.

6--Very full-- A full beard, not trimmed. May be slightly bushy but very full. Thick, full beards (moreso than B5's) are B6's. B6's beards also generally are higher up on the cheeks than B5's.

7--Longish/bushy beards- A full beard or slightly thin beard with longish fur. This beard is not trimmed and does come away from the chin.

8--Very Long Beards--

These beards are usually very bushy and haven't seen clippers for a very long time.

9--Belt-buckle-grazing long beards-- The prototype is ZZ Top. Need we say more?

While beards can be an observable trait of bears, there are other things that different people take into consideration as to "what makes up a bear", and things that people like in their bears. So, bearing that in mind (pun intended) there are other criteria that can/should optionally follow the "B" designation.

"The FUR factor": Some bears are particularly hairy about the rest of their bodies, others IN-CREDIBLY furry, yet others though rightfully bears, have little or no fur on their chests, arms, legs, back, butt, etc.

"The TALLNESS factor": To describe bears that are tall or short for their frame.

"The WEIGHT factor": For those who perfer their bears more or less fluffy.

"The CUB factor": For the junior up and coming bears.

"The GROPE factor": This is the amount one likes to be touched or pawed etc.

"The KINKY factor": for those who dare.

"The ENDOWMENT factor": sometimes a size queen's gotta do.

"TheRUGGED/OUTDOOR factor":

"The PECULIAR factor":
Some idiosyncracies --no judgement made to

THE BASICS OF RETIREMENT SAVINGS PLANS (RRSP)

PART ONE OF TWO

As a general rule, if you are between the ages of 40 and 60, a figure equal to 60-75% of your current household income is a good approximation of what you will need for a comfortable retirement. Based on 1996 figures the maximum amount of CPP (Canada Pension Plan) and OAS (Old Age Security) that an individual may receive was \$1,127.00/month. For most individuals this amount is not enough taking into consideration living costs, health care expenses, travel rental costs or property tax.

As a result, one should plan to supplement the government plans with company pension plans and personal savings.

Immediate Tax Savings

RSP contributions are tax deductible, which means that every \$1 you contribute can generate a tax refund of up to \$0.50 (the exact amount will depend on your marginal tax rate). A \$5,000 contribution could save you up to \$2,500 in tax savings or a refund. It should be noted that the maximum amount an individual can contribute is 18% of earned income from the prior year, to a maximum of \$13,500. Earned income includes employment income, rental income, self-employment income, royalties and alimony or separation payments received. You can find out how much you are entitled to contribute by looking at your Notice of Assessment - this is the form you get in the mail each year after filing your tax return.

Maximize your RRSP Contributions

If you are unable to maximize your RRSP contribution, you may want to consider borrowing.

In most situations you will be better off borrowing to make your contribution than not contributing at all. You are not entitled to claim a deduction for the interest on your RRSP loan; however, your contribution grows tax-free. If you have other investments (outside vour RRSP), you may be better off to transfer a portion of them to your RRSP and then borrow to replace them. The interest will be tax deductible.

Don't Over-Contribute

If you over-contribute to your RRSP (contribute more into your RRSP than the allowed maximum, see above), a penalty of 1% of the excess amount per month is charged. On an over-contribution of \$10,000 the penalty is \$100/month. You are allowed to over contribute by \$2,000 without penalty, but, you are not permitted

to claim a deduction for this amount but it will grow tax-free. When you withdraw the \$2,000 from the RRSP, you will be taxed regardless. However if you leave this amount in your RRSP for 30 years, assuming you are earning 10%, your investment will be worth nearly \$35,000.

Spousal Income Splitting Opportunities

This can be accomplished simply by contributing to your spouse's RRSP. You will be eligible for the deduction, but your spouse, being the annuitant, will pay the tax on any withdrawals. Note: Any withdrawals your spouse makes from the spousal RRSP will be taxed in your hands if the contributions were made in the same year or in the previous 2 years. To avoid this attribution on withdrawals, the with-

drawal will have to wait until the third calendar year after the last contribution. For example: in 1997 vou last contributed \$5,000 to your spousal RRSP, in 1999 your spouse withdraws \$7,000, the first \$5,000 will be taxed in your hands. It should be noted that same sex couples are not eligible for these benefits as Revenue Canada does not recognize same sex couples.

Internet Bank Would Target Gays

PENSACOLA, Fla. (AP)

-- When banks refused to finance his planned gay and lesbian resort, Steven Dunlap scrapped that idea and decided to start a financial institution that would welcome homosexuals instead of spurn them.

The result is G&L Bank -- the initials stand for gay and lesbian expected to open here in the spring pending final approval from federal regulators, said Dunlap, the bank's chairman.

Not only would it be the nation's only bank catering specifically to homosexuals, it would be one of the first operating primarily via the Internet.

"The whole deal is to take banking away from you having to go to the bank and let us bring the bank to you," Dunlap said. He envisions gays and lesbians as an entry market but not the bank's sole customer base.

"Just like Federal Express is doing to overnight delivery, I expect to be the No. 1 brand name in the Internet banking arena," Dunlap said. "You're going to sort of forget, potentially, what this G&L stands for."

"The Internet now allows us to deliver to this community without having bricks and mortar," Dunlap said. "It actually allows me to put a bank

branch in every house where there is a computer."

Internet banking remains in its infancy, however, so G&L has had to do extensive research and development. That effort is headed by G. Kay Griffith, G&L's president. She had always been interested in civil rights and the opportunity to be part of such a pioneering effort was too attractive to pass up. The bank's 11member staff is almost equally split between homosexuals and heterosexuals.

Six Ideas For a Prosperous New Year by KATHY KRISTOF San Jose Mercury News

It's time to make some wise moves that will save you money in the new year. Here are a half-dozen ideas for a more prosperous 1999.

- 1. Do an annual investment review. You don't have to do this often, but once a year investors ought to take a look at the individual stocks and mutual funds in their portfolios. If it's underpriced in your estimation, it's time to consider whether you ought to buy more. If it's overpriced, you ought to consider whether the opportunities are better elsewhere.
- 2. Set up an automatic savings plan. Years ago, people found it hard to save regularly because they found themselves walking past a variety of retail stores as they headed to the bank to deposit their checks. Today, there is no excuse. You don't need to walk to the bank. Almost every major corporation allows you to have your paycheck electronically deposited.

3. Review your insurance. Over the past year, the competitive pressures in the insurance industry have been increasing. largely to the benefit of consumers. Everything from life insurance to property and casualty coverages are now being offered at lower rates than they were a year ago. Indeed, some insurance agents say that level-premium term life policies are now selling for about half what they cost a year ago.

4. Knock down consumer

debt. Do you maintain bal-

ances on your credit cards? If so, it's time to figure out how to pay them off. If you leave a balance on a credit card and pay only the minimum amount due, you're likely to pay for each item you bought four to five times before vou're through. That's a waste, so, here's the plan: Go to www.cardtrak.com and see if there is a credit card that invites balance transfers at a lower rate of interest than you're currently paying, if so, switch.

5. Consider a refinance. If you have a home and a mortgage, check your interest rate. If it's over about 7.5 percent, there's a very good chance that you can cut your costs by refinancing. Interest rates have dropped steadily over the past year and now hover around 7 percent for a fixed-rate mortgage. Moreover, there are a host of lenders who are offering deals with no upfront costs.

The one caveat on these no-cost loans is that many have prepayment penalties, so if you think you'll refinance again within five years or so, make sure you know what it will cost you on the back-end.

You, your spouse and kids probably raked in a bundle of goodies over the holidays. So now is the ideal time to make some room. Besides, all of those old clothes, toys, shoes and other usable items that you give away

might provide you with a

tidy tax deduction.

6. Clean out your closets.

And, while you're at it, scare up a manila envelope and write 'charity receipts' in big, bold letters. Then, every time you give away some cash or clothes, date the receipt and put it in the envelope.

THE HISTORY OF MY LAW PRACTICE

My practice is one that is geared to meet the legal needs of the gay and lesbian community in the Kitchener-Waterloo area. My purpose in establishing this practice this summer was twofold. First, I wanted to serve the day-today needs of a group of people whose needs were apparently not being met by local practitioners. Secondly, I hoped to provide a positive vehicle for social change in a smaller community outside of Toronto.

I conducted research while completing my articles and bar admission course in 1997 for the purpose of preparing a business plan for this practice. Through this research I determined

that there were a significant number of lawyers practising within the gay and lesbian community in ans in the absence of legislative change...

It was my intention to

operate a practice which would welcome all of the diversity of the area's gay and lesbian population. I also hoped that the practice would provide a much needed central point of reference within the community. To achieve these goals I instituted a sliding fee structure to attract to my practice those from all social classes within the community. I planned to advertise in a wide range of publications so as to

raise awareness of my practice among as many people as possible. I also began collecting information on community resources to provide to my clients and others who might need them.

Toronto but very few elsewhere. I found this surprising given the monumental changes brought about by Charter litigation, which has expanded the rights of gays and lesbi-

My business idea was well received by everyone I approached. In particular, the bank manager who approved my application for financing indicated that the bank recognized the reality of the changing family unit. Members of the bar and other professionals in the area were positive to the idea and were extremely helpful in assisting me when I had questions or required assistance.

I proceeded to open my office in downtown Waterloo in July of 1997 have been very busy since then.

My advertising campaign in the straight press provided the expected number of clients however my greatest success to date has been in attracting members of the gay and lesbian target market to the practice. At the outset I expected that it would take years to develop the practice within the community. My advertising in the gay and lesbian press proved to be

phenomenally effective and the impact of this advertising was immediate.

Despite my understand-

ing of the structure of the

community however I had underestimated the power of word-of-mouth advertising. Speaking to one person in many cases launched a domino effect leading to referrals to others. I also had not realized the extent to which the community was under serviced, even though one of the reasons I started the practice had been to provide legal services to an under serviced group. I had underestimated, for example, the reluctance of members of the community to reveal the details of their personal relationships to straight lawyers. Consequently, I found that members of the target group were extremely receptive to the idea of a gay and lesbian practice in their community and liberally provided referrals generating a large number of new clients.

The practice also serves

the needs of those outside of the gay and lesbian community and provides typical general practice services to the public. The fear expressed by several of my friends that my straight clients would bolt my practice when they discovered the characteristics of my core cli-

entele has proven un-

founded.

The ultimate goal of my practice is to raise awareness of gay and lesbian issues in my larger community. It is my hope that by providing legal services to the local gay and lesbian community and acting as a resource to the various groups within the community that my practice will contribute to an attitude of increased understanding and tolerance in the community as a whole.

THE COALITION FOR SUPPORT OF LESBIAN, GAY, & BISEXUAL YOUTH IN WATERLOO REGION

The Coalition for Support of Lesbian, Gav & Bisexual Youth had its beginnings in 1992-1993, when a group of concerned citizens began meeting to explore ways to support LGB youth in Waterloo Region. Today. the Coalition's membership is made up of youth. private counsellors, and representatives from Waterloo Region's Community Health Department: ACCKWA, (the Aids Committee of Cambridge. Kitchener, Waterloo and Area); Waterloo District School Board, Guidance Heads: The Elementary Teachers' Federation of Ontario, Waterloo Region Teachers' Local; and Family and Children's Servies of Waterloo Region.

The group came together in response to concerns raised by gay youth regarding the lack of services designed to meet their specific needs, and a growing awarness on the part of professionals that youth of minority sexual orientation faced very unique struggles.

Youth culture and families and schools can all demand a conformity at times that can't be achieved if one is lesbian or gay. Too often this leaves gay youth in the closet, in isolation, or in hostile environments. The results can be devastating:

- the suicide rate for lesbian and gay youth is 4 times or more greater han for straight youth
- one third of youth who complete suicide are gay or lesbian (despite common estimates that homsexuals comprimise only one tenth of the population, and the fact that many don't come out until later in life.)
- one third of street youth in downtown Toronto are lesbian or gay
- 48% of street youth in downtown Toronto are from Southern Ontario (stats are from S.A.S.-Safe On the Streets)

The risk of HIV infection is especially high for young gay men, who may not have access to appropriate information regarding safe sex. Lesbian, gay and bisexual youth are also more likely to drop out of school, leave home early, and abuse substances because of the hostile or homophobic environments they are exposed to.

The Coalition's focus has largely been on public education workshops for people working with youth, such as teachers, guidance counsellors, social service workers. and other health care professionals. It also provides advocacy and information to workers. parents and youth who ask for assistance. This past fall, the Coalition began a networking group for people working with youth, and for peer advocates in the schools.

Our most recent, and possibly most exciting, project is the launching of a planning committee to begin the planning of a

"Oranges Are Not

The Only Fruit "

Director: Beeban Kidron **Cast:** Geraldine McEwan, Charlotte Coleman



Review: Adapted for BBC-Tv by Jeanette Winterson from her novel of the same name Oranges chronicles the coming-ofage of a young British lesbian, Jess (Geraldine McEwan). In her turbulent struggles with her domineering evangelist mother (Charlotte Coleman), Jess grows up to be a fiercly independent young woman. This poignant story features a marvelous ensemble cast and charming performances from the two lead actresses. The film received the Audience Award for Best Feature in the 1990 San Franciso International Lesbian and Gay Film Festival.

Midnight In The Garden of Good and Evil–1997



Director: Clint Eastwood Cast: Kevin Spacey, John Cusack, Jack Thompson, Alison Eastwood, The Lady Chablis, Irma P. Hall, Jude Law, Dorothy Loudon

Review: With his most ambitious film to date, though not necessarily his most accomplished, director Eastwood takes a walk on the wild side--Southern style--in bringing John Berendt's bestseller to the screen. Eastwood wouldn't exactly be at the top of the list to helm a Southern Gothic mystery-comedy, but its theme of murder and of its moral ambiguity have found their way in many of his best and most recent films (Unforgiven, A Perfect World etc.) Based on a true story, "Midnight In the Garden of Good and Evil"

casts Cusack as John Kelso, a New York writer assigned to cover an exclusive society party in Savannah. Agendas change, however, when Jim Williams (Spacey), the party's host, is arrested that night for shooting his hustler boyfriend (Law). Was it self-defense premeditated? Eastwood is able to convey the rythms of Southern culture and attitudes with a leisurely tempo, though at 154 minutes the film is entirely too long... Also of note are Thompson as Williams' dedicated and bulldog attorney: Hall as a spirtualist who may know more than she lets on; and stealing every scene she's in is The Lady Chablis, a transvestite playing herself who has undoubtedly learned through years of performing just how to snare the spotlight.

Theater Review: Comedy casts two gay couples in Bible tales

NEW YORK -- It has not been a good theatrical year for gay biblical revisionism. First, we were visited with Terrence McNally's Corpus Christi, which told the story of Jesus as if He were a 20th-century gay man. Now comes Paul Rudnick's The Most Fabulous Story Ever Told, which appropriates a familiar homophobic gibe to transform Adam and Eve into Adam and Steve, with a lesbian pair named Jane and Mabel for company. Rudnick's play has the virtue of being funny, at least most of the time, but it isn't appreciably more trenchant.

The comedy at the New York Theatre Workshop is really two plays, one per act. In the first, Rudnick seems to be reworking The Skin of Our Teeth as he introduces Adam, Steve, Jane and Mabel as

the world's first humans and parades them through various biblical events -- the expulsion from Eden, the flood, the exodus -- up to the birth of Jesus. Much of this is rather more free with logic than you may accept, but it does allow the playwright to indulge an agreeable fondness for anachronism. (During their cave-people phase, the four principals enumerate their contributions to humankind: the wheel. the lever, shampoo and conditioner in a single bottle.)

The possible existence of a god is much on everyone's mind -- Adam is a believer. Steve is not -- and comes to the fore in the second act, which takes place on Christmas Eve in Adam and Steve's New York apartment. Steve has AIDS; Jane is pregnant with a child conceived with Adam's sperm; and among the guests invited for the evening are a flaky female Mormon and a disabled lesbian rabbi, on hand to marry Jane and Mabel. Describing life's unfairness, the rabbi says, "I'm paralyzed and Brooke Shields has a series."

Where Act 1 owes its tone and substance to Thornton Wilder and biblical film epics. Act 2 is clearly Rudnick's homage to Angels in America. But it's no less scattershot than Act 1, being an uneasy mixture of mordant gags (many supplied by Steve Bartlett, a stitch in several supporting roles) and theistic argument about the apparent contradiction of a god who promulgates both life and death. Rudnick resolves the discussion neatly enough, but it's impossible to ignore the feeling that you've heard most of it before.

Because Rudnick cranks out funny lines the way Bayer cranks out aspirin, The Most Fabulous Story Ever Told is blessedly easy to take even at its most aimless, and the cast directed by Christopher Ashley (headlined by Alan Tudyk as Adam, Juan Carlos Hernandez as Steve, Becky Ann Baker as Jane and Kathryn Meisle as Mabel) is pleasant company. Yet the play feels thrown together, a casserole of a few good ideas and quite a bit of filler. Notable in the latter category is the omnipotent stage manager (Amy Sedaris) who wanders through the show cuing every single effect --a fittingly godlike device, but eventually a tiresome one.

Adriene Wentworth Water In The Eyes of Time

How Mark Tewksbury Came Out

The Canadian Olympic swimmer made a big splash with the announcement that he's gay, and succeeded in making the occasion pride-filled and spiced

tirely public that he's a gay man, and he wanted to make the event not just proud, but joyful. He chose December 15 for the airing of an interview on CBC's Newsworld and the opening of his oneman show "Out and About" at Toronto's Buddies in the Bad Times Cafe (performed that night as a benefit for the Casey House AIDS hospice), and followed up with a media conference on December 17. His remarks have also raised a couple of specific issues regarding corporate discrimination and the lack of pride proclamations by his native Calgary.

Although a couple of editorials have taken a whocares position on the matter. Tewksbury's had some 65 additional requests for interviews and at least 17 writeups in Canadian media so far, so clearly there is interest. After all, he was not only the nation's sweetheart as an athlete, but was also visible everywhere for awhile in product promotions and charity pitches, and went on to be a popular motivational speaker. He said himself that. "Maybe it shouldn't be an issue. I'm hoping in 10 vears, it is not. But the reality of 1998 is, you're here, we're here ... it is an issue, it still is."

First, it should be understood that Tewksbury has not been very closeted since leaving swimming after the 1992 Olympics he just hadn't discussed his orientation with the media or in public. He was seen in gay venues around Toronto even in 1992. Although when "Frank" magazine tried to follow up on it then, Tewksbury's agent had them publish a letter denying that Tewksbury was gay and even inventing a girlfriend, and in 1994 Tewksbury went to Australia rather than face the "outing" music -- but by May of this year, Toronto's gay magazine "Xtra!" ran a photo of him arm-inarm with another man, his partner Benjamin Kiss.

Tewksbury even realizes that many people had already assumed he was gay during his swimming career. He said, "It would be hard for people not to have known. There was no girlfriend. I was 'way out there. If you guys [in his theater audiencel could have seen me. I was screaming back then. too. I was just leading cheers, that's all. But I was very good at what I did. People wanted to be like me. It was an incredible way to see how creative you can be. The swimming part was here, and the sex part was over here. And never shall those two meet. And it's OK, as long as we don't speak about being gay and touch people."

When a "financial institution" which is "not a bank" (and definitely not the Investors Group, a significant sponsor of his swim-

ming career) cancelled a six-figure contract for his motivational speaking services on the grounds that he was "too openly gay," Tewksbury came to a turning point. Once he told the world that this was what led him to become still more open, naturally there was great interest in just which financial institution had been so blatant in its homophobia -- but Tewksbury is standing very firm about not telling. On the one hand, he said he "did not want to dwell on the negative:" on the other, he wanted to first consult with the company to make sure his sexual orientation was not merely an issue for one or

His one-man show. which he hopes to take on the road (even back home to Calgary), relates his life story just as his motivational speeches did, but including and emphasizing his sexual orientation -- and humor. "I'm not just gay, I'm a screamin' queen, so if we're going to use a label, let's get it straight!" he said. "I always knew. My first sexual fantasies were about men. And then we went through the 'playing

with Barbies in the bathtub' stage. And there was the whole drag queen side," beginning with trying on his mother's clothes in his childhood. (In the show, he plays several characters, including his grandmother and a cheerleader.)

But it was no laughing matter to grow up gay in Calgary, which Tewksbury described as "not the most diverse of cities in the country," although he refused to be baited into describing it as redneck. "The voice inside my head for years was focused only on the things about me that I hate. Because I've been coming from a place of fear, of half-truths. When I was growing up. I used to stand in front of mirrors and think about killing myself because I was gay. And that's still the number one motivation behind teen suicide. That little part of me remained locked up for 30 years, and finally at 30, I am free of that. I am open to who I am. I've never felt freer. better, more whole as a human being than in the last couple of days. My worlds are finally integrated. It's too painful to llive a double life."

In his youthful struggles. "Luckily there was swimming. Luckily there was sport. I think sport saved my life to a certain extent when I was a teenager." And he even feels that his struggles as a gay youth somehow made him a stronger competitor, although he says that. "Sports is the last closet." He had a crush for some time on swimmer Victor Davis. who knew Tewksbury was gay and looked down on him for it -- but didn't blow his cover. Tewksbury describes Davis as having "spit in each of his opponents' lanes to intimidate them." But at the 1988 Olympics in Seoul, where the two men were part of Canada's 4x100 medley relay team, Davis put his arm around Tewksbury while psyching him up for the team's bid for a silver medal. Tewksbury said that. "was the first time that I felt like I had been accepted for being gay, and for being a swimmer." They won the medal.


New mom **Jodie Foster** made a rare appearance

She considered becoming a writer; it had been easy to pump out papers and articles at school. She just followed the rules, completed assignments.

"I got followed into the restroom and then this cop -- I didn't know it was a cop, obviously -- he started playing this game, which I think is called, 'I'll show you mine, you show me yours, and then when you show me yours, I'm going to nick you,'" Michael said.

"Actually, what happened was once he got an eyeful, he walked past me, straight past me and out, and I thought, that's kind of odd. I thought, maybe he's just not impressed. And then I went to walk

back to my car, and as I got back to the car, I was arrested on the street. ... If someone's waving their genitalia at you, you don't automatically assume that they're an officer of the law. ... I've never been able to turn down a free meal," Michael joked.

Michael said he isn't in an open relationship, he's



just oversexed. "I'm not saying that I have an open relationship with my boyfriend but he knows who I am," Michael said.

"He knows that I'm generally oversexed, so he's been very, very good. ... We love each other and he understands that it was a stupid mistake and he's forgiven me, I hope."

Michael thinks his arrest may have involved some cooperation between Beverly Hills police and Britain's tabloid press.

"I don't think it was by chance that this happened to me," he said. "We have some fairly vicious people in the country where I come from and they work in certain streets in London. I think it might have had something to do with it. ... There was a little more cooperation than you would expect between the police and the paparazzi."

Michael also said he didn't feel outed by the arrest because he thought he was already out. "I really thought to my fans I outed myself with the last album because -- and it wouldn't seem that

way in America because in America there hasn't been that much publicity about me in the last seven or eight years because I just haven't been here or been on TV -- but, actually, there's been a lot of publicity about my sexuality over the years in Europe and my ex-partner's death was reported very widely, so when I dedicated the album to him and wrote the album for him. I felt like I was coming out to my fans, and I didn't really care about people who weren't interested in my music," he said.



"So, I certainly wasn't gonna go to [the journalists on London's] Fleet Street and say, 'Yes, I'm gay," Michael said. "The main point is that I outed myself in my life about eight or nine years ago and I've been out with everyone in my life -- even casual acquaintances, my family, friends -- anyone who's met me within that time has known that I'm

gay, just not the press.

"So, really, this doesn't feel like an outing, this is just public outing. But any gay person who comes out realizes that the tough bit is your friends and family and that was a great thing - it was a great, liberating thing and I did it a long time ago. I don't know if I would have come out to the press. They would have got me, some way or other. This is how it ended up because I wouldn't give it to them."

Michael's new single and video, "Outside," which debuted during the MTV broadcast, is all about public sex and police repression of its practitioners.





Those in society who make snide remarks, who call different people fags accentuate this reaction. Religious leaders who crusade against homosexuality make it difficult if the child is being reared in a home where religion is important. The message of judgement rather than love comes across.

As a parent myself who raised three boys, I would have found it difficult (but possible) to accept one of my sons coming out to me at an early age although if one were to come out to me now, I would hug him and be there for him. Perhaps my own coming out made a difference BUT a parent often has hopes for grandchildren and such so when my boys reached puberty between 1980 and 1986 I would have had a difficult time with it particularly since my wife would NOT have accepted it. Indeed, I was one of those who was different back in elementary school and learned how to hide it by trying to show the world I was heterosexual myself.

Interestingly, I was raised during the 50s when I knew nothing of homosexuality and even

though I knew I was different from the other boys, and I looked at other boys in scouts etc. the subject was completely taboo. My own coming out did not start until I had reached the top rank in my career and my sons were becoming independent. I can attest that the hiding can not last - one has to be honest with self and after burying it so long it is more difficult to admit one is gay in one's youth. I have heard men in their 40's and 50's who only came out after depression, alcoholism, and other such problems made them admit they were not living the life they were born to live. Once they come out, things are much better. Trying to live a lie is difficult at best.

Parents have a responsibility to make themselves available and to listen to our children. Too often in our world we let the TV and day care and neighbours look after them and do not begin to try to understand. If only the young guy can reach out to his parents, it will be immensely easier - I could not with my parents and hope I was there for my boys. As I admit I would have had difficulty at first, I would like to think I would have been open to them still and that they knew it. I believed in guiding rather than ordering and I spent much time with my sons - I tried not to be judgemental as my ex was.

Parents, teachers, and others have to be raised to be open and accepting. Hate does not always happen in cases where someone is assaulted physically. Too often as sault comes from those whom we trust parents. teachers, religious leaders who use mental assault rather than physical. How different it would be if people could be loving and caring rather than judgemental and hurtful!

LOCAL CHURCH BECOMES AN AFFIRMING CONGREGRATION

During 1998. Westminster United Church explored becoming an affirming congregation. An affirming congregation within the United Church of Canada is one that recognizes bisexual, lesbian, and gay persons as people entitled to all the rights and responsibilities of membership in the Church. Basically it means that everyone is welcome to attend the church, become a member, and/or become actively involved in the church.

The process of exploring what it means to be an affirming congregation involved a congregational discussion with a minister and lesbian couple from Bloor Street United Church in Toronto, which is an affirming congregation. Another congregational discussion was held to look at what the scriptures and the United Church had to say about homosexuality and what it all meant. A congregational survey was held on the issues and a few more

smaller discussion groups.

The following paragraph was added to the Westminster's Mission Statement at a congregational meeting held November 22, 1998:

"To create an environment of openness for all people. To affirm that all who seek to live faithfully regardless of ability, age, ethnicity, gender, race, sexual orientation, or social circumstances are welcome to full participation in the life of the congregation. To foster full opportunity for participation by all in the wider church." Church Council will be looking at changing our advertising, a service to celebrate becoming an affirming congregation, performing same sex unions, and developing plans for continued support of gay, lesbian, and bisexual people in the coming months.

Westminster United Church is located in the Cedars Worship Centre at 543 Beechwood Drive in Waterloo. Temple Shalom and Westminster United Church share the Cedars Worship Centre. Westminster's services are held Sunday mornings at 10:30 am.

There are other affirming congregations in Ottawa, Kingston, Peterborough, Toronto, Winnipeg, Saskatoon, Calgary, and Vancouver, with other congregations in the process of looking into it.

to the eternal damnation, referring to Bobby as sick, perverted and a danger to our children that his spirit was broken until he could no longer rise above the injustice of it all.

Bobby ended his life at age twenty. "It was not God's will that Bobby jump over the side of a freeway overpass into the path of an eighteen-wheel truck, killing him instantly. Bobby's death was the direct result of his parents' ignorance and fear of the word gay.

"An injustice has been done not only to Bobby but to his family as well. God knows it isn't right that Bobby is not here with loved ones. Correct education about homosexuality would have prevented this tragedy. There are no words to express the pain and emptiness remaining in the hearts of Bobby's familv members, relatives, and friends. We miss Bobby's kind and gentle ways, his fun-loving spirit, his laughter. Bobby's hopes and dreams should not have been taken from him, but they were. We can't have Bobby back; if we could we would say to him, as I say to all gay and lesbian people around the world, these benevolent words of Leo Buscaglia:

'Love yourself -- accept yourself -- forgive yourself and be good to yourself, because without you the rest of us are without a source of many wonderful things.'

"There are children like Bobby sitting in our congregations. Unknown to you, they will be listening to your 'Amens' as they silently cry out to God in their hearts. Their cries will go unnoticed for they cannot be heard above vour 'Amens'. Your fear and ignorance of the word gay will soon silence their cries. Before you echo 'Amen' in your home or place of worship, think and remember...a child is listening."


